Biggest Air Show Ever Held In Maritimes

Some forty Canadian aircraft performed in the biggest air show ever held in the Maritime provinces to stage the major attraction for the final day of Summerside's Lobster Carnival. The day closed out a highly successful week in which an estimated 10,000 people visited the Civic Stadium, the Bill Lynch midway and the harness racing at the Summerside Raceway. Saturday afternoon, following the airshow at R.C.A.F. Station, the parade of floats, successful contestants in the various events held during the week, attracted many hundreds of spectators, culminating with the crowning of the Lobster Queen at eight o'clock in the evening. The giant airshow at R.C.A.F. Station drew an estimated six thousand people who witnessed what was perhaps the most impressive demonstration of flying ever seen at the Summerside Station. The show was officially opened at 2.30 o'clock by His Honor T.W.L. Frowse, Lt. Governor of the province, who said that the fact the official Air Force Day at the Station had been postponed in order to tie in with the Summerside Lobster Carnival, was another indication of the fine cooperation which exists between the personnel of the Station and the people of Summerside. Premier A.W. Matheson and Mayor W.A. Currie who were present on the reviewing stand extended their words of appreciation to G.C. Swetman for his gesture of cooperation in holding the airshow in conjunction with the Lobster Carnival. Group Captain W.E. Swetman, commanding Officer of the station extended a welcome to all visitors on behalf of the station personnel and paid tribute to Wing Commander Limpert and his staff whom he said had been working hard since April to make the show a success. Ideal weather conditions prevailed throughout the afternoon, making it possible to hold all the events scheduled and permitting the hugh throng to enjoy it in comfort. Eight types of RCAF and naval aircraft took part. They included F-86 Sabre jets, CF-100 jets, Neptune and Tracker anti-sub bombers Mitchell and Lancaster bombers, DC-3 Dakotas, a single-engine Otter bushplane and a banana-like helicopter. A Sabre opened the big show with a bang by breaking the sound barrier 40,000 feet above about 3,500 visitors at the Maritime Air Command's reconnaissance training base. Sleek Neptunes that daily patrol the Atlantic impressively demolished a wooden submerging with a well placed bomb. Squat Trackers, to be used on the new aircraft carrier Bonaventure, made short, fast take-offs and landings. A parachute drop, clearly visible against the bright afternoon sky, a demonstration of precision bombing, fire fighting show, thrilling fly pasts by Sabre Jets, travelling at six hundred miles an hour, formation flying by the Neptunes, the Lancasters and the Navy Fliers, all added to the success of the show. Another highlight was a demonstration of how an injured airman can be rescued by Helicopter hovering above and drawing the injured man to safety. Inside the hangars spectators were invited to view an immense display showing the equipment used by airmen on Arctic flights, equipment for Arctic survival, course, displays of firearms and ammunition, radar demonstration, photographic displays, in fact every phase touching on the life of an airman in the service.

BATHURST, N.B. (CP) — The bodies of Mrs. Antoine Dalgle, 47-year-old widow and her daughter, Alfreda, 13, were found in the ruins of their burning log cabin home early Sunday. The cabin was located on the Miramichi road about three miles south of East Bathurst. East Bathurst firemen were alerted by neighbors who noted the fire around 3 a.m., but they could do little to fight the flames due to lack of water. The charred bodies of the victims were discovered in the only bed. They had apparently died of suffocation. Cause of the fire has not been determined.

Cement Stoppage Blocks Industry By RUSSELL LANE CHICAGO (AP)—A strike in the U.S. cement-making industry is playing hob with building and road construction jobs. It has slowed or stopped work on military projects, roads, factories and housing worth more than \$1,000,000,000. These effects have turned tens of thousands of construction workers out of their jobs. The cement output in the U.S. is running about one-half the normal volume. About 70 of the 149 plants which turned out 316,465,000 barrels of cement last year are shut down. Of 36,000 persons employed in cement manufacture, some 16,000 are on strike. The union's dispute with manufacturers involves renewal of one-year employment contracts, most of which expired May 1. Negotiations have been conducted on a local basis and strikes have been spreading throughout the industry as stalemates developed. EASTERN CONCENTRATION Regionally, the strikes are concentrated in the east and southeast, with a spotty situation prevailing in the midwest, and the majority of southwest and far west plants in operation. The result has been a rapid drying up of local stocks where nearby producers are shut down. Contractors are scrambling for supplies from Western U.S., Canadian or Puerto Rican sources. In New York state, construction delays affecting projects worth \$500,000,000 have made idle some 35,000 building and paving workers. There were some fears that work on the U.S. section of the St. Lawrence Seaway might be delayed by the strike, but officials said recently they think they will be able to ride out the shortage. Another \$500,000,000 in construction has been halted in New Jersey.
