POLIO INOCULATIONS in rural school clinics are available for infants from 6 months, preschool and school children, teen-agers whose 19th birthday doesn't come before December 31 1957 and pregnant women. There is a series of 3 polio inoculations. The 1st and 2nd are given four weeks apart and the 3rd inoculation not sooner than 26 to seven months after the 2nd. Inoculations against diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, and smallpox vaccination also given. Keep in touch with the teacher who will be notified of the first clinic date.
