It is stated that Mr. W. D. Stewart does not keep his engagements with the countrymen who come to see him on public business.

A number of tavern keepers will, this morning appear before the Stipendiary Magistrate to answer the charge of selling liquor on the Lord's Day.

CARRIED AWAY.—At four o'clock on Saturday evening, when off Governor's Point, the Rocky Point ferry boat was struck by a heavy squall, which carried away her mast. She returned to this side without further damage.

The steamer "Miramichi" arrived from Montreal yesterday evening. She reports that the Island boat left Point du Chene at four o'clock yesterday morning. She did not meet with any stranded or wrecked vessels along the coast.

ON Saturday night, shortly after eleven o'clock, a sailor, on "his road a'board," was attacked by a gang of roughs on King St., who maltreated him in a brutal manner, and left him lying in the mud. Now, since we have an additional force of police, such work as this should be looked to and the culprits rigorously punished.

CAPT. STEELE, whose sad death we chronicled in another column, belonged to Georgetown, and was on his way from Pictou to Georgetown when the disaster overtook him. How he happened so far east is unknown. Capt. Steele was one of the best of Pilots in the Straits. His body was taken to Georgetown on Saturday night.

WAR NEWS.

LONDON, Nov. 3.

Gold 102 1/2; Exchange unchanged.

The London Times reviews the present position of the Asiatic campaign as follows:—"Devabayun, the crest of the range, is 2000 feet higher than the surrounding plain and presents every feature of a most desperate resistance. If Mukhtar Pasha reaches this safely, he will throw 25,000 men into very formidable works. Derabayun will defy an attack in front, and at this season a flank movement over mountains from eight to nine thousand feet above the sea level presents an almost insurmountable difficulty.

Referring to St. Petersburg reports of negotiations for the surrender of Kars, the Times says that it cannot credit the rumor that the commandant has entered into negotiations for the surrender of the fortress, being aware that very large supplies of ammunition, small arms and artillery were thrown into the place in July, August and September, and that the commissariat storehouses were completely replenished so that it cannot be starved into surrendering. A Bye-Law Relating to Commercial Travellers.

As it Enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, as follows

AFTER the passing of this Bye-Law, no Commercial Traveller or Agent, who is not a rate-payer to the said City, shall offer for sale or sell, within the said City, any kind or description of goods, wares or merchandize, either by samples or otherwise, without first obtaining a License from the City of Charlottetown for the purpose, such License to be under the Seal of the said City, and signed by the Mayor and City Clerk; and for the granting of such License the applicant shall pay to the City of Charlottetown the sum of Fifty Dollars, to be paid to the City Treasurer, to become part of the revenues of the City.

This Bye-Law shall not apply to any person resident in this Province, bringing produce, provisions, fuel or supplies, nor to any person who is bringing fuel or agricultural produce to the City.

Any person violating this Bye-Law shall be subject to, and liable to pay a fine of not less than Twenty-five Dollars nor more than Fifty Dollars, in addition to the License fee, for each offence,—to be prosecuted by any party who may inform, in the name of the City of Charlottetown; and, on conviction and non-payment of the fine imposed, imprisonment for not more than thirty days in the Charlottetown prison; and the trial of any such offender shall take place before the Stipendiary Magistrate of the City of Charlottetown, in the City Court, and the fine shall be paid to the City Treasurer.
