THE PRESBYTERIAN SYNOD

Twentieth Century Fund and Other Subjects Considered.

The Maritime Synod, which has been in session at Truro for several days, stands adjourned to meet at Chatham, N. B., in October of next year. The proceedings of the Synod were very interesting. Rev. E. A. McCurdy was moderator.

The augmentation committee's statement showed that grants were made to 61 congregations, requiring \$11,500; contributed \$9,722.65; 115 congregations gave the full amount asked, 87 gave less than the amount asked, 33 gave nothing. To make the income meet the expenditure, \$12 were kept from all settled augmented charges, and a proportion from those settled part of the year. Expenditure was \$17,44 more than the income, reducing the working balance by that amount. Sixty-one grants are made for this year, requiring \$10,000, being \$1,500 less than asked last year.

Regarding the Presbyterian College at Halifax, Dr. Sedgwick pointed out that the annual contributions were larger than in any other year. There were 103 congregations contributing, but still a larger annual amount is needed. They received \$4,414.10 this year, against \$9,915.96 last year. While the cost of the new building was \$20,752, there has been received to date \$13,627, leaving about \$7,000 due; but a large amount of this is already subscribed, reducing the indebtedness to about \$3,500.

The report of the Directors of the Ladies' College and Conservatory of Music showed that the attendance for the year was 455 as against 397 the previous year. There are now 10 more residential students and 25 more general students than this time last year. The receipts of the two institutions had been \$25,504.00, and expenditures only \$24,960.90, leaving a snug little balance to the credit of the institutions.

Dr. Campbell, Moderator of the General Assembly of Canada, explained the 20th Century Fund of \$1,000,000, it is hoped to raise before the end of 1900. The first department is \$400,000 for the debt fund. This is for the help of struggling congregations burdened with debt on their church property. A man will be appointed to go out with a subscription book and do practical work in removing the debts and to encourage those who can pay off their own debts, but are not doing so. It would be proposed to a congregation with a debt of considerable size, that if they raised \$1,000 for the common fund, a large portion would be returned to them to relieve their own needs. Another department is to get strong congregations who are putting out a large contribution, to take weaker ones under their wings, and devote a part of their contributions particularly to it or to apportion a small amount in the hands of the fund, to be used as the contributing church may designate at a later period. The Common Fund will be \$600,000, of which nearly one half will be for missions. The large sum of money spent annually in interest of the mission department, is to be done away with, and the work extended. This department will have \$104,000. It will also have a church and manse building fund. The detailed statement of the expenditure of this \$600,000 of the second department is as follows:

Rev. Dr. Robertson, from the North West, spoke also on the same subject, giving good encouragement from the West.

Dr. Gordon, Halifax, spoke as to the amount of the \$1,000,000 expected to be raised by the Maritime Synod. This body last year raised \$400,000, out of \$2,500,000, for all church purposes, that would be that this Synod may be expected to contribute \$175,000. Dr. Campbell pointed out that subscriptions can be allotted to any of the schemes of the Fund, that they may be paid at any time, and that minister's contributions are expected to be credited to their congregations. The ministers throughout the Church are attempting to raise among themselves 1-10—\$100,000—of the whole fund, thus each minister on the average, will give one-tenth as much as his whole congregation. The ministers are taking the lead in giving, and are asking their flocks to follow.

A series of comprehensive resolutions was moved by Robert Murray and spoken to by ministers and elders. There was interest intense, and perfect unanimity with every point; the last resolution expressing full determination, by God's help, to bring this great enterprise to a successful conclusion, was carried by a standing vote. Dr. Gordon, at the request of the moderator, offered prayer.

A committee has been appointed to carry out the directions of the synod and of the assembly. The organization for securing subscriptions is complete. Eight
