A CHILD IS BORN . . . A PRINCE OR PEACE?

Some years ago two or three men were lost in a Canadian forest. They were very tired. Their camp had overturned in a rapid and they had reached the shore only to find that the boat had overturned. Then they tried to take a short cut through the bush to their camp and soon lost all sense of direction and as the rain settled upon their confusion was complete.

But one of their number was a navigator accustomed to steering a ship by the stars. Shortly after midnight the clouds broke and he caught sight of a star. He did not take any long to find their location and direction, and a few hours he brought them to their camp.

This is just what happened to the prophet Isaiah in one of the darkest nights of his nation's history. Their king was a fool, the course he was taking meant ruin. Isaiah had brought him a word from God that opened a way of escape from the calamities impending, but he refused to listen to it.

To the prophet Judah's future looked black. Impoverishment through the overhauling clouds, the king caught sight of a star of promise, and soon he saw the way was opening to a bright future.

This is how he describes it: "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who dwelt in a land of deep darkness, upon them has light shined."

The star of hope was the birth of a Deliverer.
