## PC Gov'ts Raked At Eilerslie Meet

An enthusiastic crowd of about 20 people Friday night nominated Harris Rogers, Brae, and Raynald MacNeill, Mount Royal, to the post-conference and assemblyman respectively for the Second District of Prince in the next provincial election.

The meeting, held in Eilerslie Hall, was addressed by one of the newly-nominated candidates, provincial Liberal leader Alex Matheson, J. Watson MacNaught, J. George MacKay and Neil MacLeod. Clint Morrison presided at the meeting.

Mr. MacNeill was nominated by acclamation, while Mr. Rogers' lone opponent was William Newcombe, Northam.

In thanking the people for having nominated him, Mr. MacNeill said "I am honored that you have chosen me; it is not only an honour, it's a privilege." Mr. MacNeill asked for the support of all residents of the district, stating that, "you cannot win an election alone. We need one another, the support works both ways."

Mr. MacNeill discussed provincial affairs, the devalued dollar, education, roads and what he called "inefficiencies" of the Conservative Party. Commenting on the current government's austerity program, he said, "it may not be as bad as the 20's, but we are certainly in a depression." Mr. MacNeill accused the Conservative Party of "lack of plan. They haven't even a plan when to get up or to bed," he added.

He stated that the new regional high schools being constructed throughout the province were examples of the Shaw government's lack of plan. "They don't seem to worry about the pays for them," he continued.

Mr. Rogers, in his thanks to the people said "I realize deeply the trust and responsibility you have placed in me. I will work to the utmost to do all in my power to serve you if elected."

He congratulated his opponent, Mr. Newcombe for "losing valiantly." He said Mr. Newcombe was one of his best friends and only remained of the race because he was a good sport.

Directing his remarks towards party leader Alex Matheson, Mr. Rogers declared, "We should act as if we were elected. There is a growing awareness in higher circles of the Liberal government of the needs of the Second District of Prince."
