Family Allowance Cheques Totalled \$2,747,088 in '57

During the year 1957, the Federal Government through its Regional Office in Charlottetown, issued to recipients of Family Allowances in the province of Prince Edward Island 155,900 cheques totalling \$2,747,088. This was announced by Alfred S. Tait, Regional Director of Family Allowances, Charlottetown. These cheques are printed locally in the office of Mr. G.A. Cairns, District Treasury Officer, Department of Finance, whose staff services the Regional Director's Office. Normally Family Allowances cheques are deliverable on the 20th of each month, unless the 20th falls on a Sunday, in which case, the cheques would be deliverable on the 19th of the month.

BY FAMILIES The number of children in families for whom Family Allowances were paid varied from one to thirteen. The classification of families for the month of December, 1957, is shown in the following table: Families with one child 4,111

During the year the Regional Office received 2,768 completed registration forms on behalf of newborn children or for those on whose behalf Family Allowances were not paid previously. The largest number of applications in any one month was in September when 321 were received. By way of contrast, in 1957 allowed cheques were stopped on behalf of 1,678 children who became sixteen years of age and for 54 children who died.

LOST PAYMENTS Fifty-five parents lost payments of one month or more during the year because the completed registration forms were not received in the Regional Office within thirty days of the child's birth. If parents do not wish to lose monthly payments for new born children, Mr. Tait urges that registration forms, which are available in all hospitals and post offices and at the Regional Director's office, be completed and forwarded so as to be received in the Regional Office within thirty days of the child's birth.

Some persons have the mistaken idea that registration of a

child's birth with the Provincial Vital Statistics authorities is the same as registration for Family Allowances. Some have been in the habit of not applying for Family Allowances until the child's birth has been registered and a birth certificate is obtained. A birth certificate is not required to be sent with the completed registration form for Family Allowances. Furthermore, Mr. Tait pointed out that application for Family Allowances and registration of a child's birth are two different processes. When the registration form is not received in the Regional Office within thirty days of the child's birth, payment of allowances commences with the month following the month when the registration form is received.

RATES OF PAYMENTS The first change in rates of payments since 1945 was effected in the month of September, 1957. Instead of the four different rates of payments made in accordance with the ages of the children, monthly allowances are presently being paid at the rate of \$6 per child from birth up to and including the month of the child's tenth birthday and at \$8 per child between the ages of ten and sixteen. The largest average amount per family in any one month under the increased rates was \$18.54 as compared to \$16.90 based on the old rates. The largest average allowance per child received in any one month during the year was \$6.70. The largest total number of children on whose behalf allowances were paid in any one month was 36,686.

Youngsters Build Rockets; Worry U. S. Army Experts

NEW YORK (AP) — In thousands of backyards and garages youngsters of the space age are constructing rockets that arch out of sight into the skies — or explode with sometimes tragic results.

The rockets range from bits of pipe packed with gunpowder and fired with an old car spark coil to a dynamically designed, missile worthy of engineers. And the list of accidents grows every week.

From 17 states come the probably incomplete total of two deaths and 58 injuries in the last few months. A teacher and an 11-year-old boy were killed, a 15-year-old suffered a brain injury, other boys lost fingers, damaged their eyes, burned and scarred their faces, mangled their arms and hands.

Maj.-Gen. H. N. Toftoy, head of the huge army Redstone experimental centre in Alabama, commented: "We don't want to lose the next crop of young scientists before they get started."

Redstone now issues a list of precautions for science teachers. Army experts are preparing a booklet on the art of building safe backyard rockets.

Salk Vaccine Supplied For Age Groups 19 To 40

The Department of Health, during the past week, had distributed supplies of Salk anti-polio-vaccine to doctors in the Province requesting it. This vaccine is to be given to the age group nineteen to forty years and is provided free. The physician will charge the usual fee for giving the inoculation but there will be no charge to the patient for the vaccine itself.

The Department of Health strongly urges all adults between nineteen and forty years of age to obtain protection against poliomyelitis now. Two doses, one month apart, should be had this spring and the third required dose late in the fall or next spring.

Although in past epidemics the greatest number of polio cases occurred in the under twenty age group, the percentage of deaths and severe paralysis was much higher in the 20-40 age group. It is essential, therefore, that this latter group have protection. The under twenty group has been covered by the Department of Health's public clinics and regular clinics. All children between the ages of three months and nineteen years may continue to
