FORTY HOURS' DEVOTION.—The service of the Forty Hours' Devotion began in St. Dunstan's Cathedral at 8 o'clock this morning, when the Mass of Exposition was celebrated by Rev. R. B. McDonald, assisted by Revs. J. Eneas McDonald and Dr. Curran. The Mass of Exposition will be celebrated on Wednesday morning at 8 o'clock. Tomorrow morning High Mass will be sung at nine o'clock.

BAKED ABANDONED.—Mrs. Bertha R. Gerard, wife of Capt Gerard of the bark Siddartha, today received the following telegram: "The bark Siddartha, abandoned at sea Captain Gerard and crew landed at Amsterdam. All well." A young man named Russell, belonging to Malpeque, was one of the crew. The Siddartha was owned by Senator Wood, of Sackville, who sent the despatch to Mrs. Gerard. The bark was built in 1880 and was 438 tons. Mrs Gerard has been in Charlottetown all winter. She will leave in a few days for Sackville.

POLICE COURT.—This morning Philip Doherty, charged with the larceny of a pair of overcoats from R. H. Ramsay & Co's store, was sentenced to one month's imprisonment with hard labor. James King, who lives in Essory's Lane, was sentenced to twenty days imprisonment for stealing a quantity of coal from Clarkin Bros. at one o'clock on Sunday morning. The value of the coal stolen amounted to 20 cents. King admitted the theft and said he wanted the coal to make a fire for himself. Albert P. Allin and Patrick Dennis, charged with drunkenness, were each fined \$5 or 10 days. The hearing of the case against Patrick Gormley, charged with the same offence, was adjourned for one week.

TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.—The meeting on Saturday evening was well attended and proved most interesting and helpful. The first hour was taken up with a discussion on home study, with especial reference to reading, after which Supervisor Stewart read a portion of London on education, dealing principally with the power of retention. ST. DUNSTAN'S CATHEDRAL.—The fourth of the series of special sermons was last evening delivered by Rev. Dr. Morrison, his subject being "The Interpretation of the Sacred Scriptures. After showing how it was possible to misconstrue the scriptures and pointing out the importance of having some well-defined authority to assist in interpreting them, Dr. Morrison claimed that the Church—the pillar and ground of truth—was the custodian of God's legislation and its Divinely appointed interpreter. If every one was allowed to interpret the constitution and the laws of a country according to his own ideas what a deplorable condition of affairs would arise. Hence the constitution of judges and courts to properly interpret the laws. If judges and courts are necessary to explain the laws of the land how much more important is it that there should be some recognized authority to interpret the scriptures, which are so often misconstrued. The Church is not above the scriptures any more than the judge is above the law; its mission is to explain their true sense and set aside doubts which may arise. The exposition of Catholic doctrine upon this point was very clear, and the discourse was followed with the closest attention by the large congregation.
