# Alcohol Ed. Conference Starts This Weekend

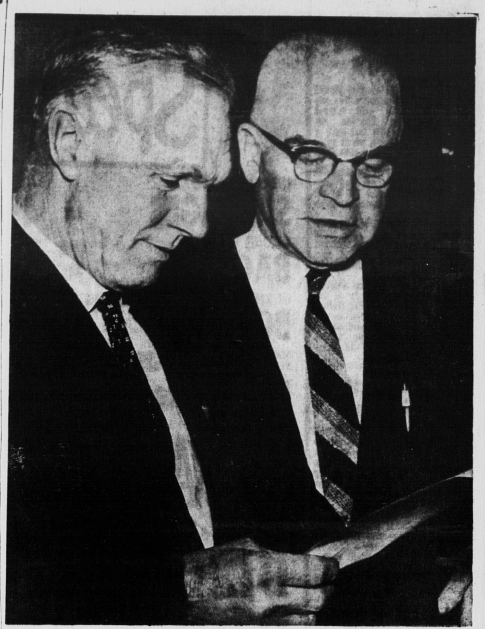
The fourth annual Alcohol Education Conference under the division of alcohol studies, the department of education will be held Friday morning at the Basilica Recreation Center.

## 2-Year Sentence Given For Fraud Convictions

GEORGETOWN — Pleading guilty to three charges of obtaining goods by false pretences and two others of forging documents, in each case a cheque, and attempting to use same as if they were genuine, Royce MacFlether MacMaster, Dundas, was sentenced to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary on this count.

The accused appeared before Acting Siding Magistrate Charles R. McQuaid, QC, in Kings County magistrate's court, Georgetown, yesterday, and was remanded by Vernon J. Fraser of Souris. The magistrate directed that the sentences were to run concurrently.

The crown was represented in this case and all others on the docket by Deputy Attorney-General J. Arthur McGuigan, QC.

At the time of his arrest the sum of \$18 was found in his possession and the magistrate ordered that the money be assigned among the five cases as partial restitution.

AS A RESULT of the charges, Lawrence Edward Burke of Charlottetown pleaded guilty to a charge of assaulting his wife by grabbing her by the throat with his hands, and he received a two-year suspended sentence.

He was also ordered to enter into his own recognizance in the amount of \$1,000, with the condition that he stay away from the residence of his family and that he support his wife and family and that he carry his voluntary agreement to enter Riverside Hospital for treatment.

The accused was also represented by Mr. Fraser, and a suspended charge of attempted arson was withdrawn by the crown.

Convicted of selling liquor to another person, Vernon J. Fraser, was fined \$20 and costs or three months in jail.

WITNESSES

Giving testimony for the crown were: Lawrence William MacQuaid, Montague; John Melvin Fraser, Victoria Cross; Const. Kenneth Wesley Lorne and Col. Douglas J. Heuser of the RCMP, Montague. The accused, counselled by Gerald T. Foster, QC, offered no evidence on his own behalf neither did he call any witnesses.

Also convicted on a similar offence, Harry George Meyer, Montague, received a similar penalty despite the fact that he was not absent from his home.

The magistrate ordered that the case be gone ahead with until the terms of the Criminal Code which allows for certain cases to be heard in the absence of the accused or his counsel.

Crown evidence was presented by: Frederick Lyle Bohner, Montague; Const. Bill E. Foster and Reginald B. Lutes of the Montague RCMP.
