## Roof Fire Extinguished

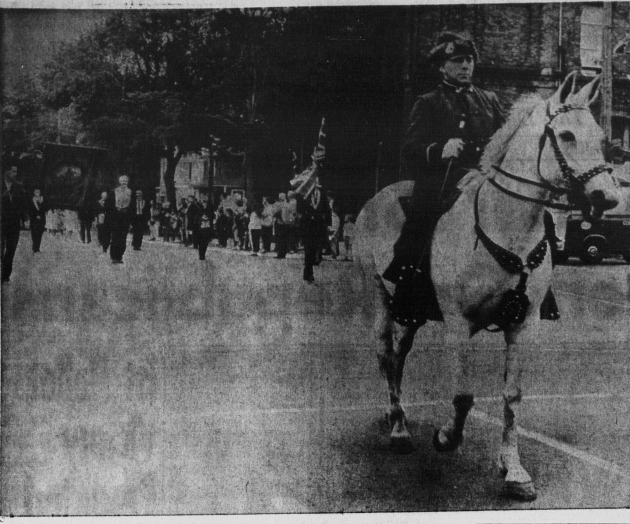

## Pickers Urgently Needed As Berries Ripen Suddenly

Orisa is awaiting the Island's strawberry industry, which according to employer relations officer John Smethurst of the National Employment Office of Charlottetown has become "big industry."
