HAY TIME THOUGHTS
Haymaking has always received a great deal of attention from poets whose attitude was likely influenced by the fact that they did not have to use the fork. Until about five years ago progress in labour saving devices for haymaking was slow. For nearly fifty years the dump rake and horse mower were standard equipment with the heavy forking in the field, at the barn and in the loft falling to the farmer.

The first great labour saver was the hoisting equipment, this came in about seventy years ago but with the exception of limited use of hay loaders little progress was made until balers and forage harvesters made their appearances.

For many years on the average mixed farm investment in haymaking equipment was quite modest but the current scarcity of farm man power has changed that and today it is not uncommon to see a machine worth over a thousand dollars in use.
