Replies Received By Travel Bureau

The provincial travel bureau has already received some replies to 3,000 questionnaires it sent last week to tourists who visited the province last summer.

The Maritime Provinces travel bureaus are carrying out a joint survey which is expected to show the value of the tourist industry to the area.

Nova Scotia and New Brunswick were expected to send out about 20,000 questionnaires each.

Manitoba, 31 to Alberta, 31 to British Columbia, and 15 to Saskatchewan.

Typical questions directed to tourists are: How many days did you remain in the province, how many persons were in your party, how much money was spent by you and your party during your visit, what type of accommodation did you use, how did you enter the province and what activities did you indulge in while here.

When replies are received, statistics will be compiled by a Nova Scotia department of agriculture economist, and a meeting of tourist bureau directors will be held to evaluate the statistics.

Of the 3,000 questionnaires sent out by the province, 1,572 went to the United States, 862 to Ontario, 457 to Quebec, 32 to

NCAA Unwilling To Arbitrate Feud With AAU

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP)—The president of the National Collegiate Athletic Association Wednesday said his organization is unwilling to arbitrate its long feud with the Amateur Athletic Union.

The NCAA president, Dr. Henry B. Hardt of Texas Christian University, said the Oakland Tribune in an exclusive interview that the AAU must instead deal with the new U.S. Track and Field Federation, of which the NCAA is a member.

Hardt, from Fort Worth, said the AAU once agreed it could negotiate with the federation through a new committee which would violate international rules.

He insisted that if the AAU wants to negotiate with the federation it can because it agreed to do so in front of Attorney General Robert Kennedy in New York last November, and there's no question about it, he said.

The AAU told President Kennedy Monday it would be willing to arbitrate the long feud over control of track and field, but it said it would arbitrate with the NCAA, not the federation.

President Kennedy appointed Gen. Douglas MacArthur as arbitrator Dec. 12 and he was approved by the federation.

Ivan Sees Move Start Towards Major Hockey

ST. LOUIS (AP)—The general manager of Chicago Black Hawks of the National Hockey League said Wednesday the arrival of the Syracuse farm club to St. Louis may be a step toward bringing major league hockey here.

The Braves of the Eastern Professional Hockey League moved their franchise Monday from Syracuse to St. Louis.

General Manager Tommy Ivan said if the National Hockey League should decide to move into St. Louis, the city would have a nucleus with which to start.

"We could have moved elsewhere," Ivan said at a press conference, "but we think St. Louis has potential. Sure, it's going to be difficult, but it will work out."

Ivan said the Braves will be in St. Louis for the next three months and will return next fall if the crowds are better than the 700 they were drawing per game in Syracuse.

Ivan said he would be happy if the club draws about 3,000 fans a night in St. Louis.

APPOINT GAGNON

OTTAWA (CP)—Dr. Paul E. Gagnon, 61, has been appointed special assistant to the editor-in-chief of the National Research Council scientific journal, it was announced Wednesday. A native of Kingsay, Que., he taught at Quebec City's Laval University from 1951 to 1960, when he became director of the division of exchange and training of scientists and experts with the international atomic energy agency in Vienna.
