

# Frank Mahovlich Returns To Form

TORONTO (CP)—Frank Mahovlich, whose fluctuating play produces alternating moods of ecstasy and gloom among Toronto fans, had everybody wanting him for their valentine here Saturday night.

The Big M loosed one of his patented shots midway through the third period and almost tore the Detroit Red Wings net from its moorings in giving Toronto's Maple Leafs a 2-1 win over the visitors.

"I didn't even see it until I noticed it lodged in the mesh," said Mahovlich afterward. The goal was his 15th of the season, the payoff in a recent return to top form by the big left-winger after a so-so stint that included some time in hospital for an ailment never made public.

The booming shot, from the circle to the right of Detroit goalie Roger Crozier, ripped the stick out of defenceman Bill Gadsby's hands and went into the far side of the net.

Crozier made only a token effort to move for the save. He was still watching Gadsby's sprawling attempt to smother the shot when the red light went on behind him.

**FELT GOOD**

"Sure it felt good," was Mahovlich's reaction in the dressing room as he and the Leafs made a quick change to street clothes before flying out for Sunday's game in Boston.

But while the winger has apparently recovered his scorching touch, Leaf coach Punch Imlach had other worries—on defence—and the same problem worried Detroit coach Sid Abel.

Gadsby caught one of Bob Fildorff's shots on the front of his left ankle that denied the

guard and shattered a blood vessel.

"Never seen anything like it before," said the sturdy rear-guard. "It went up... just like that"—and he moved his hands in a growing circle.

Abel, off in a corner, contemplated some lineup changes should Gadsby be sidelined.

Imlach, meantime was on the phone to check on the status of defenceman Kent Douglas who stopped a shot with his thumb in the third period.

He was taken to hospital to have the injury x-rayed but Imlach was not sure he would even make the plane out for Boston, let alone play.

"I still don't know the extent of the injury," said Imlach. "We'll just have to wait and see."

These were the sentiments expressed by Charlottetown's Dougie Cameron upon receiving the MacDonald Tobacco Trophy emblematic of the men's provincial curling championship at the Charlottetown Curling club, Saturday afternoon.

The Cameron foursome will represent Prince Edward Island in the MacDonald Brier Tankard competition which is scheduled for Saskatoon, March 1-5. The winning rink went through the provincial tournament without suffering a single defeat and wound everything up Saturday afternoon by eliminating the Gord Spicer foursome of Summerside's RCAF station 9-6 in the finals.

In the opening frame of Saturday's contest Cameron was lying one and Spicer number two and Doug had last rock. The Charlottetown skip made a nice draw to 6 o'clock on the 8 foot circle to count two Spicer deliberately blanked the second frame in order to maintain last rock and in the third the Cameron foursome was lying two and Spicer made a cold draw for shot rock position and counted one, to trail the Charlottetown rink 2-1 at the completion of three ends of play.

Dougie had to draw to a junked up house with his last rock in the fourth and he placed the rock at 8 o'clock on the 8 foot circle to take a 3-1 lead in the championship battle.
