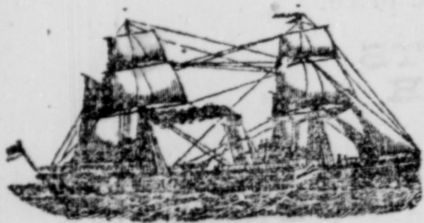

### The Army Medical Library.

Both library and museum date their existence from the late civil war, whose horrors and sufferings prompted a profound study of military medicine and surgery. In 1862, Surgeon General Hammond directed all medical officers of the army "to collect and forward to the office of the surgeon general all specimens of morbid anatomy, surgical or medical, which may be regarded as valuable, together with projectiles and foreign bodies removed, and such other matters as may prove of interest." The office of the surgeon general possessed about 850 books on medical subjects at that time, when congress legislated to appropriate \$6,000 yearly for the purchase of reference books to be used in the compilation of the "Medical and Surgical History of the War." In 1865, Dr. John S. Billings, U. S. A., was placed in charge of the embryo enterprise and his wide, grasping mind instantly seized this opportunity to lay the foundation of a national medical library. The success of this scheme, under his energetic administration as curator for 30 years has been phenomenal.

Since April, 1897, Dr. J. C. Merrill has been in charge of the library, which at present contains on its shelves 120,000 volumes of bound books, and more than 200,000 pamphlets, besides a valuable collection of atlases of plates and engravings, and is acknowledged to be "the most complete collection of medical literature in the world."—Godey's Magazine.

### New Zealand Mutton.

The story of a New Zealand sheep designed for the London market may be very briefly told. It is taken from the run to the slaughter house, killed, dressed and transferred to the cooling room. The skin and superfluous fat are retained; after ten hours' cooling the carcass goes into the refrigerating room for 36 hours. Thence it goes to the storing room, and when it has been enveloped in its cotton "shirt" and labeled is ready for its journey over sea. The steamers which bring the meat to us through the tropics have, of course, to be fitted with refrigerating appliances, and our sheep takes its place among thousands of others, some of the boats being fitted to carry as many as 70,000 carcasses at one time.

There are 88 vessels engaged in the trade, capable of transporting 6,700,000 sheep per annum. Arrived in the Thames, the barges come alongside the vessel, and the sheep is transferred to a cold storage station. Here it may lie for weeks or for months if necessary, so that—an important commercial advantage—there is no necessity for immediate sale on a depressed market.—Godey's Words.

### The Fare and the Fine.

A good story is told of a certain Scotch baillie who, on rising one morning, found that he had overslept himself and had but a few minutes in which to keep a most important appointment. Making a hurried toilet, he rushed from the house and hailed a passing jehu.

"Drive me," he said to the man, "to the courts of justice with all possible speed. On no account delay an instant." Faithful to his instructions, the driver urged his steed to its very utmost. Faster and faster they went until, after an exciting drive, he deposited his fare at his destination in time for the appointment, but not before he had damaged a passing vehicle in his mad career. The baillie, on alighting, handed him his fare, with the addition of a substantial tip, and then, to the man's astonishment, pressed 30 shillings into his hand, at the same time saying, "Here's 30 shillings, my man. You will be brought before me tomorrow for furious driving, and I shall fine you that amount."

"I cannot too strongly impress upon you, Philip," said Mrs. Grubbs, "the fact that things in general are not automatic—that is, they will not do themselves—and the longer you put off the attack upon them the harder they are to tackle. To things that require deliberation you will give sufficient thought; but, as to the run of things that come up, acquire the habit of disposing of them as they come along; you will find it a great help in many ways. Don't cord 'em up, Philip. The first thing you know you will have more stacked up than you can saw, and then, too, the pile is liable to fall on you at any time and hurt you. ### NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The revenue of the British Government during the past quarter increased £489,581 (\$2,447,905), as compared with the same period of 1897.

—According to the Brantford Expositor some of the Tory newspapers have been saying unpleasant things of Messrs. Tarte, Blair and Sifton. In Russia they prohibit the publication of papers that criticize the office holders. Unless something is done to curtail the freedom of the press in Canada, the people will know too much.

—The Springfield Republican suggests that the United States should annex Spain. The Mail and Empire thinks this would be better than taking the Philippines by a good fight. If Uncle Sam is going to be a world power, he can get more trouble for his money in Europe than anywhere.

—The Toronto Star, commenting upon the proposal of the International Commission, says: The Canadian members, are all Liberal, and three of them members of the Cabinet. It was not necessary to restrict the choice in this way. Mr. John Charlton's claim to seat on the Commission seems to be that he is a boss-blasterskite and a secret annexationist.

—There is much to be learned about American customs and characteristics from the Spanish newspapers. One of them published in Barcelona, says: "The average height among the Americans is 5 feet 2, and they have never produced an athlete. This is due to their living almost entirely upon vegetables; as they ship all their beef out of the country, so eager are they to make money. There is no doubt that one full-grown Spaniard can defeat any three men in America."

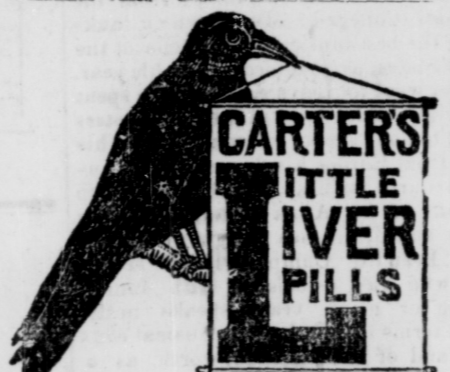
—The new Italian cabinet, of which Gen. Pelloux is premier, is the second that was formed during the past month, the reconstructed Rudini ministry having begun its brief career on the 1st of June. The prospects of the new venture are not over bright.
