VISITED MOTHER
Before beginning her new duties Mother Flora Mary went to Primrose, Prince Edward Island, Canada, to visit her aging mother Mrs. Flora MacDonald, a brother Clement MacDonald, three sisters, and other relatives living on the island. She stopped in Montreal at the mother's house of Providence. There she assisted at the jubilee celebrations of 47 sisters, including the golden anniversary of Mother Bernice, Mother General of the Providence community. At this time Mother Flora Mary received her assignment.

Mother Flora Mary joined the community in 1921 in Vancouver, Wash. Since 1923 her religious career has been connected with St. Vincent's Hospital, Portland, Ore.

Her departure from Portland ended 24 years of service in St. Vincent's Hospital, as director of the school of nursing and nursing service, the last six years as superior — administrator of St. Joseph's Hospital, Burbank, Calif.

10 Cases Before Magistrate At Georgetown

At magistrate's court, Georgetown, yesterday, before stipendiary magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet, four persons were charged under the Highway Traffic Act. An assault case was dismissed, and a case under the Game Act postponed until Dec. 3rd.

A resident of Gaspareux under the Traffic Act, driving without registration, was fined \$10.00 and costs, while a resident of Burnt Point was also fined \$10.00 and costs for driving without due care and attention. The same party was fined an additional \$10.00 for using license plates not issued by the department.

A resident of Charlottetown was fined \$10.00 and costs for speeding through the town of Montague while a member of the R.C.A.F. Summerside paid a similar amount for speeding on the open highway.

Under the Temperance Act, a resident of Georgetown, having no permit and having liquor in his possession, was fined \$20.00 and costs or thirty days; also two residents of Little Harbor were each fined \$10.00 and costs or thirty days for being intoxicated in a public place, while a resident of Nova Scotia was fined \$60.00 and costs or thirty days for being in control of a vehicle while impaired.

The case of an assault charge by a resident of Abney against another resident of Abney was dismissed.

Mr. J.P. Nicholson represented the Crown in all cases.

Loyalty and long years of devoted service to places far removed from their native heath appear to be an outstanding trait of the Matheson family of Glen William.

Elsewhere is given a sketch of the late William Matheson, who spent forty-six years in Canada's West. The following is an outline of the career of his sister, Jessie. In 1913 Miss Jessie Matheson

arrived at the little hospital at 21 Goddard St., Brockton, Mass., operated by Dr. Henry E. Goddard and his son, Dr. Samuel W. Goddard. She came "to help out for a few days", and remained for 43½ years, her working lifetime.

Miss Matheson retired October 1st this year. At this time she was Director of Nurses, a post she had held for 13 years. Be-

fore that she had been nurse-anesthetist for thirty years. Over the years she had been the "lady in white" to literally thousands of patients, who had occasion to be given medical care at the Goddard Hospital.

Miss Matheson underwent her nurse's training at the MacLean Hospital in Waverley, Mass. On her retirement she plans to remain in Brockton.
