FESTIVE. -The Drill Shed, to-morrow evening, will be beautifully decorated with flags and bunting, the grounds adjoining, the use of which Governor Haviland has kindly permitted, will be brightly illuminated in the evening. The Band of the 82nd Battalion will play a selection of airs; and as there will be strawberries and cream, ices, etc., in abundance, and plenty of room for all, a pleasant time can be expected.

A CORRESPONDENT from County Line speaks in glowing terms of the promising crops, and the scarcity of strawberries. The "Emerald Mills" are highly spoken of, and excellent and plentiful work is being put out. The roads are improving under the work of statute laborers, and a substantial bridge is to be erected on the Mill Road, by Duffy Brothers. Mr. Bairnsfather has been making friends, and imparting interesting instruction to the inhabitants in the vicinity.

We regret to learn that the injuries received by Mrs. J. F. Robertson, in the railway accident yesterday morning, are very serious, and it will necessarily be some time before she recovers. Mr. Robertson is better to-day, though his breast bone was severely fractured. The Sisters of the Congregation de Notre Dame, whose injuries are very slight, are in the best of spirits. They will leave for Montreal in the course of two or three days. Mrs. Walker's injuries, though very painful, are not serious. With the exception of Mrs. Robertson, we may say they all are doing well.

SMALL quantities of new potatoes are being exhibited at the market to-day. Some are remarkably fine, while others would be better in the ground. The Patriot says: -"J. D. Mason, Esq., has brought us the first early potatoes of the season. They are of three varieties, the Triumph, the Beauty of Hebron, and the Early White. The specimens of the first two varieties are quite large, but the last is rather diminutive as yet. It is, Mr. Mason informs us, just two months since these potatoes were planted. It is not a usual thing, even in the most propitious seasons to have new potatoes fit to eat on the 17th July.

BEATS THE RECORD. -On the Gentlemen's Driving Park at Morrisania, New York, on the 13th inst., Dick Swivel and his mate Edward trotted a mile to Road Wagon in the unprecedented time of 2:10. They were driven by the well-known jockey Johnny Murphy. The New York Herald says: "They got safely around the turn and sped down the side at a gradually accelerating pace, reaching the quarter in 33.1 seconds. They were now fairly flying, and without skip or break the half was reached in 1:05, showing the second quarter to have been done in 31.2 seconds. The half was now before Dick and his mate, and the hill on the third quarter slowed them down so that it was 1:40 before their heads reached the third post. The third quarter occupied 35 seconds. Nothing but a break could now stop their winning the match, and Murphy, nursing his charges with consummate skill over the dead homestretch, shot them under the wire in the unprecedented time of 2m. 10.3. Murphy weighed 150 pounds as he stepped into the wagon."
