The Crisis in New York.

New York, May 15. A better feeling prevails here to-day, owing to despatches having been received this morning from London houses, by leading foreign bankers, giving orders to buy both stocks and bonds at market prices. As it was feared that foreign orders to sell would be the chief factor in a downward movement to-day, this news was greeted with great satisfaction, and is regarded as another break in the clouds that threaten the financial world. This morning it looked as though the worst of the financial crisis had arrived, but this afternoon things took a bad turn, and the two old firms of W. Biglow & Co. and Park & Hatch succumbed and suspended. There is a great feeling of uneasiness among business men. There is a run on the banks and the end is doubtful.

Hard Weather at Newcastle.

Newcastle, N. B., May 15. Fully four inches of snow fell this morning. Two vessels are reported ashore at Belle Dune. Nothing but ice as far as the eye can see from Escuminac seaward.

Highway Robbery.

Detroit, May 15. Last night A. A. Shaw, treasurer of Clark County, was bucked and gagged at Harrison, and robbed of \$5,000. There is no clue to the perpetrators.

Fire at Moncton.

Moncton, N. B., May 16. The large carriage factory of J. H. Marks was destroyed by fire this morning at four o'clock. Mr. Marks' loss is \$6,000, insured for \$2,000.
