## MONTREAL

MONTREAL (CP) — The industrial section of the Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges scored a narrow advance Monday, its second in as many days after about two weeks of steady losses. Trading was fairly active.  
The advance was fractional in most cases, but a few issues gained more than a point.  
The weak spots were the refining oils and banks, while the constructions and base metals were mixed.  
The papers, pipelines, foods, steels and beverages were higher. Textiles were active, but unchanged.  
Among the most active issues Massey was unchanged at 14½, Brazil was off ¼ at 7. Bell failed to move at 40½. Dominion Tar was unchanged at 17½. BA Oil ¼ at 26¾. Aluminium gained ½ at 26¾. Montreal Locomotive advanced ½ at 19 and Trans-Mountain Pipeline was up ¼ at 12½.  
The penny mines and oils firmed from their morning lows and closed mixed.  
The closing averages show banks off .02 at 62.19, utilities up .3 at 156, industrials up 1.6 at 307.1, combined up 1.3 at 255.8, papers up 3.7 at 462.3 and golds off .42 at 88.41.

Golds recovered from an early loss and moved up as Preston East Dome added 30 cents at \$2.30. Dome gained ½ at 16½.  
Canadian gold kilo bars were quoted at \$33.70 to \$33.85 an ounce.  
Western oils rallied at the close as Pembina erased its early ½ loss to close unchanged at 10½. Pacific Petroleum was up ½ at 15½ and Canadian Husky gained ¼ at 11 3/8.

## NEW YORK

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market chalked up a modest advance Monday with drug and specialty shares supplying most of the push.  
After opening a shade higher, the market held the edge throughout the session. A final burst of buying sent some stocks well ahead of morning levels. Steels and motors, however, lost a bit of their earlier gains.  
Prospects for new drugs to relieve such diseases as diabetes and the common cold were reported to be behind the sharp upswing for pharmaceutical shares.  
Pfizer went ahead 6 points, Warner-Lambert more than 3, Merck 2 and Schering more than a point.  
Most chemicals, building materials, electronics, rubbers and airlines joined the broad advance.  
Copper shares retreated after cuts in scrap and custom smelter prices. Anaconda, Kennecott and American Smelting all gave up fractions. International Nickel dipped ¾.  
The Associated Press average of 60 stocks edged up 30 cents to \$222.70.  
Distillers - Seagrams added ½ point in the Canadian list. Aluminium Ltd. gained a fraction and McIntyre Porcupine dropped a point.  
Brazilian Traction, Preston East Dome and Molybdenite were ahead in the Canadian section of the American exchange. Sapphire Petroleum lost a fraction.

TORONTO (CP) — The stock market recorded a narrow advance in moderate trading Monday.  
Golds had the best index gain, up more than two-thirds of a point. Western oils and base metals were ahead around one-third. Final volume was 4,333,000 shares, the fastest session in a week, and compared with Friday's 3,895,000. Can - Erin was the most active speculative mine, losing 22 cents at \$1.98 on a turnover of 329,709 shares. Consolidated Marbenor had the best win, ahead 13 cents at 57 cents.  
Junior coppers were asier following a 1-cent a pound cut in the custom smelter price in New York over the weekend. Campbell Chibougamaou lost 40 cents at \$8.15 and Opemiska eased 25 cents at \$9.75. Consolidated Mining had the best win in senior
