A BOMBSHELL IN THE MINISTERIAL CAMP

H. H. Cook, Ex-M. P., an Old-Line Liberal, Arraigns the Laurier Government on its Record—False to Its Pledges to the Principles of the Party, and Should be Punished at the Polls.

(Continued from Yesterday.)

INCREASED THE EXPENDITURE THEY WERE TO REDUCE.

"Perhaps the most definite and positive promise made by our party to the electorate was that the public debt should be at any rate not increased, and that the annual expenditure of the Dominion should be materially reduced. This was a distinct promise; not something which might be inferred, but positively and definitely made by the convention that defined our party policy, and reasserted over and over again by our leaders. Here is the promise as made by the convention:—

"We cannot but view with alarm the large increase of the public debt, and of the controllable annual expenditure of the Dominion, and the consequent undue taxation of the people under the Governments that have been continuously in power since 1878, and we demand the strictest economy in the administration of the government of the country.

"Not to speak of statements made by other prominent and leading men of the party, for whose utterances we could hardly escape responsibility. I will give a few extracts from speeches made in amplification of this promise by members of the present Government prior to the last general election:—

"Sir Wilfrid Laurier said:—If we get into power we will follow the example of Mr. Mackenzie, and I will say that, although we may not be able to bring the expenditure to what it was under him, we can reduce the amount two, yes, three, millions of dollars per year.

"Sir Louis Davies thus understood and defined the promise made by the Liberal party:—The Liberal party says that several millions may be lopped off the present expenditure without injury to the public service."

"Hon David Mills declared that he had no doubt that the efficiency of the public service might be increased, and the expenditure reduced by almost one-half."

"Hon William Mulock was equally emphatic: There is nothing to warrant this enormous expenditure of nearly \$38,000,000, except the fact that we are burdened down with debt, and with office-holders, great and small."

"The controllable annual expenditure during the last four years of the Conservative Administration was as follows:—

1893.....	\$36,814,052
1894.....	37,585,025
1895.....	38,132,005
1896.....	36,999,142

an average expenditure yearly of \$37,370,056. During the whole time they were in office the yearly expenditure averaged \$33,535,540. This was the expenditure which, by solemnly adopted resolutions, we condemned. It was to this expenditure that the language I have quoted is applied. How have our promises and the pledges of our leaders been fulfilled? What we and they intended the electorate to understand was that if they placed our party in power the public expenditure should be reduced. This was our contract and agreement with them. What has happened? The controllable annual expenditure under the present Government has been:—

1897.....	\$38,349,759
1898.....	38,832,225
1899.....	41,903,500
1900.....	43,175,000

an average of \$40,565,196 yearly, greater by \$3,195,140 than the average during the last four years of the Conservative Administration, or \$7,026,647 more per year than our opponents spent on an average during their eighteen years of power.

"The average total yearly expenditure since the Liberal Government came into power has been \$46,616,123, as against a yearly average under Conservative rule of \$42,335,881. That is, instead of the promised decrease of from two to five millions, there has been an increase of more than four and a quarter millions yearly."

RIDDLES SIR RICHARD'S APOLOGY.

Mr. Cook then refers to Sir Richard Cartwright's apology for increasing the expenditure beyond an amount that had been condemned by the knight and his fellows in Opposition. Sir Richard said in his Toronto speech of August, 1899:—

"In 1896, when the Liberal party objected, and with good cause, to the great expenditure, I doubt, if since Canada became a nation, if since the period of confederation, there was ever a time when there was such a need for economy as there was in that year."

The dishonesty of this plea is shown by Mr. Cook, who points out that the Liberal denunciations of the former expenditure, and the pledges to lower it, were made before 1896. The convention's resolution on the subject was passed in 1893; Sir Louis Davies' remarks, quoted above, were made in 1893. It was in 1889 that Mr. Mills said the expenditure could be cut in two. Mr. Mulock's economy speech was made in 1895, and Mr. Paterson's in 1890.

INCREASED THE DEBT.

After noting that the magnitude of the public debt was viewed with alarm by the Liberals in the convention of 1893, Mr. Cook passes to the examination of the following promise in a party pamphlet issued during the last campaign:—

"The Liberal party again placed in power will stop the increase of the public debt and commence its reduction as quickly and as rapidly as possible." "Yet," says Mr. Cook, "in the face of this distinct and solemn promise the present Government have actually increased the public debt by

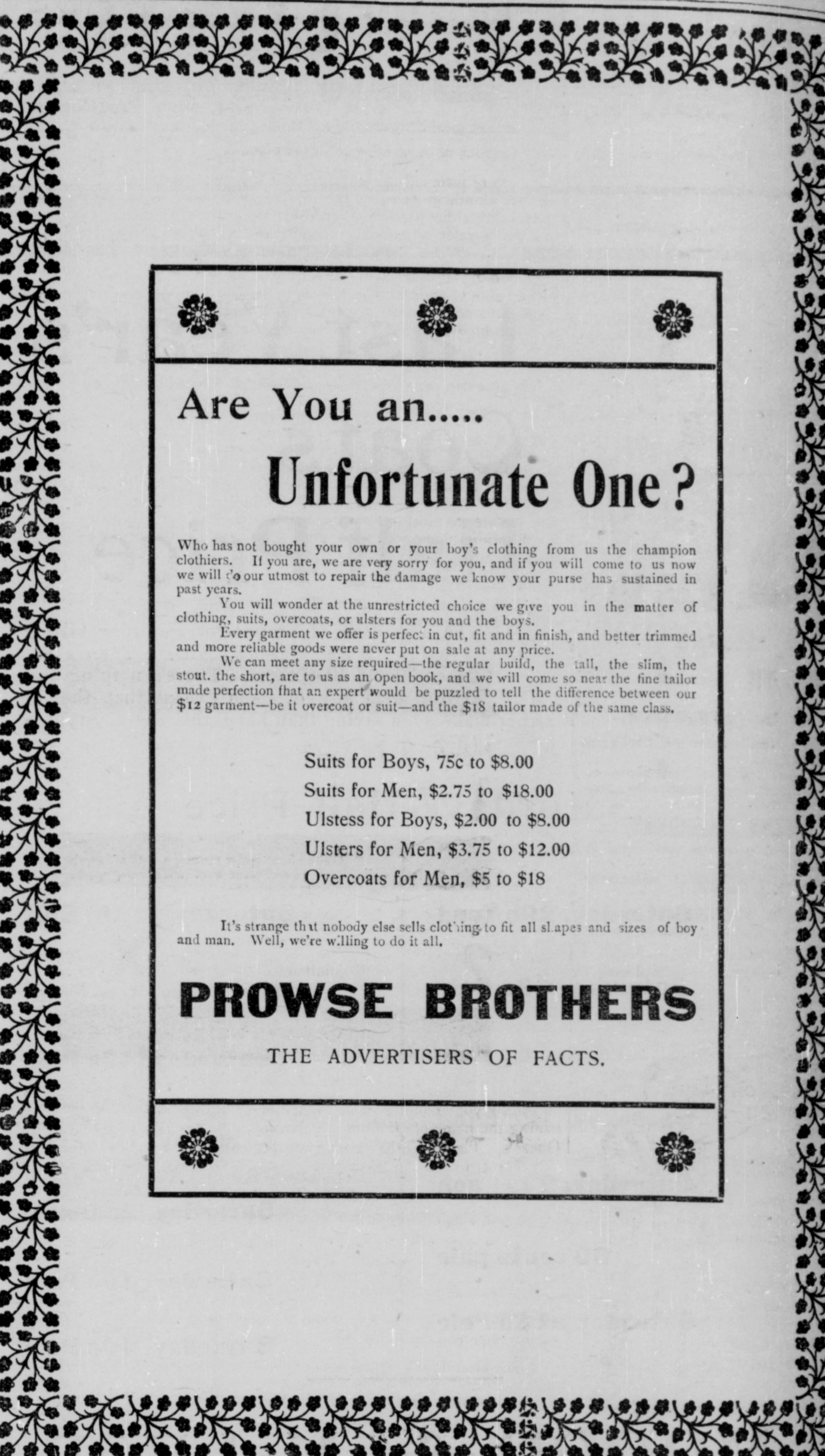
