Special Christmas Music Features S'side Services

SUMMERSIDE—Inspirational messages in keeping with the season and traditional singing of carols highlighted pre-Christmas services in which large congregations participated in Summerside churches Sunday.

At the United Baptist Church, the sermon entitled "What King Is This?" was preached by the Minister Rev. Keith R. Hobson and the music was under the direction of J.H. Leuty.

The morning anthem was "Hark, Hark, My Soul" and appropriate hymns were sung.

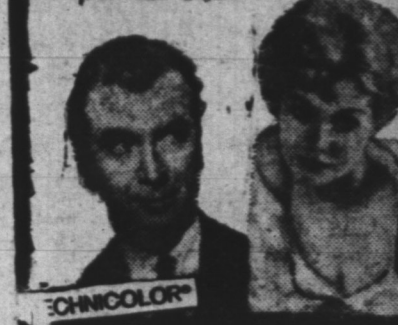

Contract Let For Dredging

A contract for \$125,320 has been awarded by the Department of Public Works to the J. P. Porter Company Limited of Montreal, for dredging at Wood Islands, P.E.I. it was announced by Hon. J. Angus MacLean, minister of Fisheries, and H.N. Macquarrie, M.P. for Queens.

The company submitted the lowest of two bids in response to public advertising. The work is specified to be completed in 12 months.

The dredging will take place in an area on the west side of the harbor basin, between the new ferry terminal and the north-east end of the west breakwater, approximately 1,300 feet long by an average width of 143 feet. This dredging is to bring the widened ferry basin to the 15-foot depth required to operate a new ferry. The Northumberland Ferries Ltd., who maintain the ferry service, require the work for the safe passage of their boat, which operates between Caribou, N. S. and Wood Islands, P.E.I.

Plans and specifications were prepared by the District Engineer's Office at Charlottetown. The work will be under the supervision of C.W. Currie, the district engineer.
