Baroness Out On \$5,000 Bail

MONTREAL (CP)—A woman who claims to be a Hungarian baroness and the wife of a British member of Parliament was released on \$5,000 cash bail Monday less than 24 hours before her scheduled preliminary hearing on charges of possessing \$1,700 in counterfeit United States currency.

Shortly after her release she was transferred to St. Mary's hospital for treatment. Nature of her illness was not disclosed. Police said her case will be called today in court but it is possible she will not appear.

Doctors had testified she was in no condition to remain in jail. She had been in jail since her arrest Sept. 20 following what police described as attempts to purchase a fur coat with counterfeit money.

Polish Athlete Forced To Run

FRANKFURT, Germany, (AP)—A Polish athlete who fled to the West said here Monday he was "forced" to compete in the European track and field championships in Switzerland last month despite an ailing foot.

Jan Miecznikowski, 22-year-old distance runner, said at a press conference here: "I told our team doctor that I wasn't able to run because of a foot injury, but he said, 'You've got to—you've got no other choice.'"

"He called a Swiss doctor who injected a pain killer into my right foot. The effect of the drug was to last 45 minutes long enough for me to finish the 10,000-metre race.

"But there was a delay just before the start of the race and by the time it got under way the drug was wearing off. I had to drop out after 18 laps."

Miecznikowski said that after the Bern games he went to the United States embassy and asked for political asylum.
