High School Red Cross Councils in P.E.I. will be represented by the following young people at the Atlantic Provinces Red Cross Training Centre which is being held at Memorial University of Newfoundland in St. John's this year. The party, accompanied by Brian Woods, teacher at Summerside, will be a member of the staff at the training centre, is leaving for Newfoundland Tuesday and will be returning Aug. 23.

It was preceded by Mrs. W. W. Reid of Charlottetown, director of Junior Red Cross for this province, who left Sunday and will be among the five directors from the Atlantic provinces and Quebec on the training centre staff. Sharon Baker of Kennington, who will be an attaché, or Junior Red Cross director, went to Newfoundland with Mrs. Reid. Last summer this training centre was held in Prince Edward Island for the first time at Montgomery Hall in Charlottetown. This year, Newfoundland is having its initial experience as the host province which will be the opening of the sessions of Aug. 16 as guests in homes in St. John's.

Directors of the training centre will be Cecil Smith of Deer Lake, Nfld, supervising principal of the Amalgamated Regional High School there, who takes a genuine interest in high school Red Cross and has done much to promote it in his own school and the feeder schools in his area.

LEADERSHIP SKILLS

These training centres enable a select group of high school students and teacher-parents to learn about all aspects of Red Cross work and through group participation practise leadership skills which will assist them to head school branches in their respective schools.

The students will also make new friends not only from their own provinces but from other parts of Canada, as well as an international contact with guests from the United States, and will be given an opportunity to carry out the type of democratic living which develops community-minded citizens.

Included in the program during the ten days of the centre's duration will be sight-seeing trips to as many as possible of the historical points of interest in St. John's one of the oldest cities in America. A trip to the American Naval Base at Argentia has also been arranged.

A swimming pool is available at the university and a qualified Red Cross instructor will be on duty to supervise the sessions and there will be outdoor sports and games, folk-dancing and dances under a qualified recreation director.

Lobster Landings Greeted At S' side

SUMMERSIDE — Visitors and Islanders alike flocked to Queen's Wharf to purchase freshly-landed lobsters on the first day of the south shore lobster fishing season Saturday. Approximately 10,000 pounds of the succulent fish were taken in by boats fishing out of Summerside. Fish dealer, Fred Arsenault said it was "about the same as last year."

Mr. Arsenault said it was too early to tell yet, whether it would be a good or bad season. Early signs pointed towards a good season, he said. During the week the catches are usually spotty but the catches Saturday were evenly spread among all the fishermen, a sign generally indicating a better-than-average season, he added.

"Monday's catches should be the best of the season," Mr. Arsenault said yesterday afternoon. "There will be two days' catches in the traps," he added, "and this should mean a heavy landing." Few of the fishermen went out to their traps Sunday.

The Summerside dealer said that as a rule catches on opening day are light as the traps haven't had time to set. Walter Somner, who landed approximately 700 pounds of lobster Saturday, didn't think

Potato Industry Warned Must Keep Pace - Or Else

"The potato industry here has to modernize and keep pace with developments elsewhere, or we'll be out of business," Lou P. McIsaac told this paper last night after returning from a trip on which he had a close look at developments in Ontario, Manitoba and such Northwestern states as North and South Dakota, and Minnesota.

Named recently to a reorganized P.E.I. Potato Marketing Board, he said "I'll be glad to work with the board if they want to really do something to improve the marketing program."

"The small grower is being forced out of business and the larger mechanized operation is taking his place, said Mr. McIsaac who described some of the equipment he saw in operation.

Speaking of Grand Forks, North Dakota, which boasts of "the most modern potato storage and handling facilities in the world," he said it is the centre for the Red River Valley area and has some interesting developments.

STANDARD BIN
The standard bin, available to a potato grower in a modern potato storage there is 12,000 to 15,000 bushels.

Mechanization includes an apparatus that can take the potatoes from a bin, move them as far as 500 yards from the bin to a grader and the entire operation of unloading the bin, grading, packaging and loading on to the transport, can be done at the rate of 500 bags of 100 pounds each, in 40 to 50 minutes.
