Marilyn Vows To Conquer Strait In Next Attempt

VICTORIA (CP)—Marilyn Bell, defeated in her first attempt to swim the Strait of Juan de Fuca, vows she will conquer the turbulent channel next time.

The 18-year-old Toronto swimmer, apparently recovered from the ordeal which ended in defeat Friday when she was within 5 1/2 miles of her goal, said Saturday:

"I learned a lot out of the swim and I am more determined than ever to do it."

She became official that the youthful swimmer will challenge Juan de Fuca's 18.3 miles of rip tides and currents again, controversy developed over whether she was allowed to stay in the water too long Friday.

"I WAS DROWNING," she said. "I learned a lot out of the swim and I am more determined than ever to do it."

Pat Russell, Vancouver girl marathon distance swimmer who helped pace Marilyn during part of her nine hours and 50 minutes in the water, said:

"Marilyn was drowning. Why didn't they take her out?"

The Vancouver Sun said the cries of an engaged group of reporters and spectators aboard accompanying boats saved Marilyn from possibly drowning.

The account said Marilyn was caught between two hysterical camps, "one of which kept urging her on while the other—including members of the press corps—yelled, 'You fools, take her out... she's drowning.'"

Finally distance swimmer Cliff Lumson, acting on orders from coach Gus Ryder, pulled her to the official boat as she lay unconscious in the water. The Sun said.

NO DANGER

Ryder denied that Marilyn had been left too long in the water. "When she asked to come out we got her out," he said.

Ryder said that half an hour after she was dragged from the water, Marilyn was "up and about."

Stewart Shoots 5-Under-Par Round To Cop Golf Ch'ship

WINNIPEG (CP)—Marlene Stewart of Fonthill, Ont., captured her sixth straight Canadian women's golf championship Saturday with a 54-hole total of 226. She capped her performance Saturday by setting a women's course record of five-under-par 72 which erased a three-stroke lead which Rae Milligan of Jasper, Alta., held going into the final round.

Combining rounds of 78-75-72 for her five-under-par grand total of 226 over the Niakwa Country Club course, Miss Stewart finished five strokes ahead of Miss Milligan, who had led from the first round.

Roma Neundorf of Toronto came in with a final-round par 77 to take third place with a 238 total, one better than Montreal's Janet MacWha, who carded a 78 on the last 18.

ONTARIO TEAM WINS

Ontario annexed the interprovincial team matches, Quebec won the two-player junior team contest and Betty Stanhope of Edmonton captured the junior singles title and the stage was set for the qualifying round today of the qualifying round Sunday of the week-long Canadian Open match play. Miss Stewart also will be defending that title.

Although both Miss Stewart and Miss Milligan are the same age—22—tournament experience paid off for Little Miss Poker Face as she reduced the margin of last year's runner-up to one stroke at the turn of the final 18 holes. Marlene took over the lead on the 10th hole as she carded a par four while Rae, playing right behind, took a six.

Miss Stewart always steady game got progressively better from then on. Miss Milligan, who had carded earlier rounds of 77 and 74, shot par golf from the 11th, but it was not good enough. Marlene rose to great heights on the back nine, shooting birdies on the 11th, 14th, 16th and 18th and paring the others. She dropped an 18-foot putt from just off the edge of the green for her birdie four on the 501-yard 18th.

In the two some with Miss Stewart Saturday was 18-year-old Betty Stanhope. Playing with the champ appeared to help Betty's game as she carded a two-over-par 79 to go with her 82 of Friday for a 36-hole score of 161—good for a three-point junior victory over Judy Darling of Hudson Que. Miss Stanhope and Miss Darling each scored 246 in the 54-hole close.

Can. Junior Tennis Officials Find Player Over Age Limit

OTTAWA (CP)—Officials of the Canadian Junior Tennis Championships being held here Saturday discovered an over-age competitor in the tournament. He was doing well, too.

Tournament officials said they had learned that Guy St. Pierre of Cap de la Madeleine, Que., is too old to compete in either of the two events he had entered—junior men's singles and boys' singles.

They said he is 18. Age limit for junior men's competition is 18 as of last Jan. 1 or later. Age limit for the boys' division is 15.

St. Pierre was disqualified at once. But whatever damage he did had already been done. For he won first- and second-round matches in both events, although he finally got knocked out of both in Saturday's third-round play.

The discovery brought about some changes in the winners' list for boys' event, but officials decided to leave things as they stand in the junior competition.

Officials said St. Pierre will be 19 later this year.

St. Pierre had beaten John Grant of Halifax in the first round of the boys' singles. Then he knocked out the second-seeded player, Charles Heinrich of Montreal, in the second round before losing Saturday to Dennis Crotty of Vercheres, Que., 6-1, 6-4.

Officials decided to match Grant and Heinrich in a replay, the winner meeting Crotty for the right to move into the quarter-finals.

Colic Attack Forces Nashua Out Of \$100,000 Handicap

NEW YORK (AP)—Mighty Nashua was stricken by a sudden attack of colic just two hours before he was to go to the post in the \$100,000 Atlantic City handicap Saturday and had to be scratched. In the absence of Mr. Williams, a 10-to-1 longshot, Blue Sparkler, won the first place jackpot of \$65,000 by half a length.

At Saratoga, Vancouver-born Healy Woodhouse gave Oh Johnny a clever ride to win the 86th running of the \$47,700 Travers Stakes. Woodhouse found an opening along the rail at the top of the stretch and went through to save enough yardage and win the 1 1/4-mile race by almost two lengths.

Nashua definitely will not start next Saturday in the \$40,000 Whitney at Saratoga, but has been nominated for the \$50,000 Saratoga handicap Aug. 23.

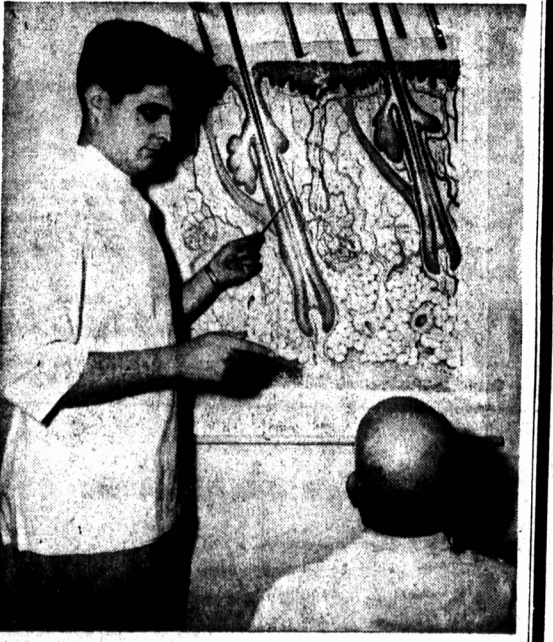

Blue Sparkler, a four-year-old filly owned by Woodland Farm of Armory Haskell, president of Monmouth Park, took the lead going into the clubhouse turn and stayed there the rest of the way to pay \$19,900 to win Sammy Soulmets was the winning jockey. Dan Farm's Skipper Bill was second, nosing out Alfred Vanderbill's Pins in a photo. Blue Sparkler was clocked in 1:49 4-5.

OLDEST STAKES

In the Travers, the oldest stakes race run on a U. S. track, Oh Johnny's time was a moderate 2:06 1-5. Oh Johnny, owned by Mrs. Wallace Gilroy, paid \$12,500 to win. Second was Howell E. Jackson's Tick Tock, a head in front of Bill's Sky Boy.

Hasty House Farm's Mahan set a track record at Washington Park in Chicago to win the \$27,500 Meadowland handicap in a photo finish. Ridden by Willie Shoemaker, the five-year-old chestnut horse from England edged Charles Fritz' Sir Tribal in the 1 1/4-mile race on grass.

At Del Mar, Calif., Ben Host won a stirring stretch duel from Pit Boss and Lucky G. L. to capture the \$15,000 Le Jolla handicap.

Banks' String Ends At 424

CHICAGO (AP)—Chicago Cubs' shortstop Ernie Banks' string of 424 consecutive games came to a close Saturday when he was taken to a hospital with a severe infection of his left hand.

Banks is the club's leading hitter with a .307 average, highlighted by 25 homers and 69 runs batted in, had not missed a game since joining the team in September, 1953.

Purchased from Kansas City Monarchs, Banks reported for Chicago's final 10 games of the 1953 season and he has played every game since.

Sets Unofficial World Record For 440 Yards

LONDON (Reuters)—Janet Ruff set an unofficial world record of 56.5 seconds for 440 yards Saturday when she retained her title at the British Women's Amateur athletic championships here.

Miss Ruff, a 19-year-old commercial artist, clipped 1-10th of a second off the previous mark, equaled by Diane Leather of Britain and P. Bryant of Australia.

The new time will stand as a British record but the distance is not recognized by the International Federation or included in the Olympic Games.

Matheson Cracks Canadian Mark

TORONTO (CP)—Diane Matheson, 19, of Montreal's Mount Royal Athletic Club Saturday broke the Canadian native women's record for the 200 metres in a qualifying heat at the Eastern Canadian track and field championships.

She clocked the distance in 25.1 seconds, clipping 1-10 of a second off the old time.

The weatherman favored the meet, a warm-up for the Olympic trial in Hamilton, Ont., Aug. 24 and 25. The Montreal co-ed has notched 23.9 seconds unofficially for the 200 metres, which is 1-10 of a second better than the official world mark set by Australia's Olympic champion Marge Jackson Nelson.

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
