Naufrage Harbor. Sir, As you are aware, a further survey of Naufrage was held last year by a Government engineer. His report has, no doubt, been handed in to the Department of Public Works long before this. Representatives McIntyre and Robertson had ample opportunity last session to urge the claims of the people of this section of the country upon the attention of the Government. Did they do it? No. They did not even ask for a copy of the report of the last survey made in connection with the proposed work. We are still in the dark as to the estimated cost. If the amount is less than that named by the engineer who made the first survey, we would like to know it. The least our representatives might have done for us was to have asked for the report, and not only for the report, but for money sufficient to build a breakwater and open Naufrage as a boat harbor, which, we believe, can be done at a cost not exceeding seven thousand dollars.

High Toned Gamblers.

LORD DUDLEY AND MONTAGUE WILLIAMS ARRESTED BY THE LONDON POLICE—ESCAPE OF SIR CHARLES RUSSELL. The hearing in the case of the persons arrested for gambling on Sunday of last week, at the Field Club, London, was continued on the 20th and resulted in the conviction of Seaton, the proprietor of the Club, who was fined £500. The players were discharged. The counsel for Countess Dudley, whose son, Lord Dudley, was among those arrested, denied that she had had any communication with the police concerning the character of the Field Club, or that she had instigated the raid. The public prosecutor announced the intention of the authorities to suppress all gambling clubs, hundreds of which exist in London. Lord Dudley has lost £40,000 within a few months, and his capture was intended to give him a severe lesson on the folly of gambling. Other youthful idiots closely allied to cabinet ministers, were caught in the same way, and the wonderfully decisive action of the police was due to their having orders from the Government. Sir Charles Russell, the eminent cross-examiner, had a narrow escape. He is fond of cars and horses, but goes in for them sensibly. With his usual bad luck, he had lost a collection of chips in which he had invested at the Field and went away just 20 minutes before the police arrived. Montague Wilson, the police magistrate, was not so fortunate. He was caught at a table with a fine collection of mother-of-pearl chips that he had won, and was walked like the rest by a humble "bobby," who dared not let him go. He gave a false name, however, and his identity was not revealed, thanks to the kindness of his fellows on the bench, and the country at large is not aware of the tricks of a magistrate who has the reputation of being one of the most severe in England.

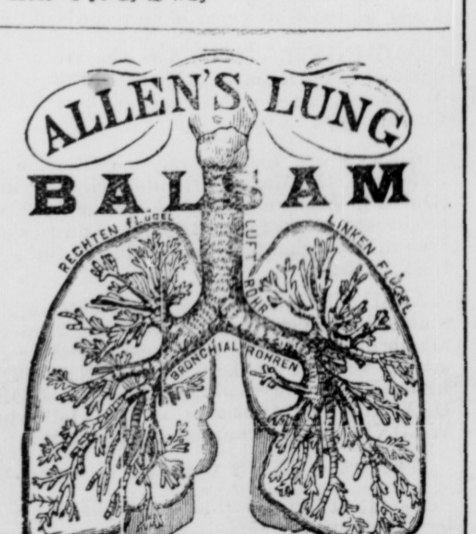

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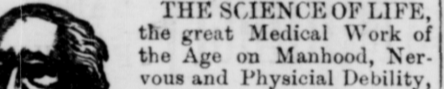
