Washington Senators Move Into Thick Of American League Race

(By The Associated Press) Washington's under-rated Senators moved into the thick of the American League pennant race Wednesday by downing Chicago 9-6 in 10 innings to take over fourth place from the White Sox.

The victory was Washington's third straight over Chicago and it moved them to within four games of the league-leading New York Yankees, who suffered a 10-9 whipping at the hands of St. Louis Browns.

Boston's young Red Sox moved into second place, 2½ games off the pace, by trouncing the tail-end Detroit Tigers, 10-3 while Cleveland Indians fell from second to third place by dropping an 11-9 decision to Philadelphia Athletics.

Brooklyn maintained its four game lead in the National League chase, defeating St. Louis Cardinals 3-1 while the runner-up New York Giants squeaked by Cincinnati 3-2. Boston Braves turned back Pittsburgh's mired Pirates 5-2 in the only other day game.

The Senators, who had lost six of their first seven games against Chicago before the series opened, won out in the 10th with the aid of wildness on the part of relief pitcher Marv Grissom. Grissom walked three batters and when Chico Carrasquel followed with an error, the rout was on. Four runs crossed the plate before Bill Kennedy retired the side.

Former Yanks Tom Ferrick, Don Johnson and Jackie Jensen played a big hand in the victory. Ferrick, relieved in the 10th by Johnson, gained credit for the victory while Jensen pitched a two-run homer in the third. Ed Robinson and Sherm Lollar homered for Chicago.

Rookie outfielder Bob Neiman's two-out homer in the eighth doomed the Yanks. The Browns collected 16 hits and committed five errors while the Yanks banded out 12 safeties and made two errors. Gene Bearden was the winner.

but he was relieved in the ninth by old Satch Paige after pinch-hitter John Sain had worked the count to three balls and no strikes. Paige fanned Sain on three pitches and, after an error, got Joe Collins and Hank Bauer to fly out to end the game.

Former Tigers George Kell and Hoot Evers slammed a home run apiece to lead the Red Sox to victory over Detroit. Kell homered with one aboard in the seventh and also clouted a two-run single in the eighth when the Red Sox wrapped up the game with a six-run blast. Rookie Dick Brodowski, making his first start, checked the Tigers on eight blows.

The Athletics also came up with a six-run rally to beat the Indians. The A's jumped on relief pitcher Mike Garcia for a half dozen runs in the eighth. Pinch-hitter Keith Thomas' two-run single and Eddie Joost's three-run double featured the uprising.

Carl Erskine, making his first start since his no-hitter over Chicago, scattered eight Card hits in heating Gerry Staley. Staley permitted only four safeties but one was a three-run homer by Roy Campanella in the fourth that decided the ball game. Stan Musial of the Cards singled in his first time at bat to extend his hitting streak to 22 games.

Whitey Lockman singled home Sal Yvars from third with two out in the eighth inning to beat the Reds. Dave Koslo, second of three Giant pitchers, was the winner and Frank Smith the loser. Bob Elliott and Don Mueller homered for the Giants and Cal Abrams for Cincinnati.

Hefty Max Surkont restricted the Pirates to five hits, besting Howie Pollet. Sid Gordon led Boston's attack, driving in two runs on his sixth homer, a double and single. Chicago Cubs and the Phillies met in a night game at Philadelphia.

3 Canadian Swimming Records Are Broken

TORONTO, June 25 — (CP)—Three long-standing Canadian swimming records were broken today in the Canadian amateur swimming championship competitions here.

More than 200 entrants competed in steaming heat in the competition that will select Canada's team for the Olympic Games at Helsinki next month.

Leo Portelance of Ocean Falls, B.C., swam the men's 200-yard breast-stroke in 2:25.8 seconds to beat the record of 2:30.6 set in 1948 by S.A. Marshal of Toronto.

Second record-smasher was Gladys Priestley of Montreal. She swam the 200-yard free-style race for junior women in 2:18.7, bettering the mark made by Irene Barr of Hamilton in 1940.

Lenora Fisher of Ocean Falls broke the third record, doing the 100-yard junior women's back stroke in 1:12.2. This compared with the 1933 record of 1:14 set by Ruth Kerr of Windsor, Ont.

In the diving competitions, Leo Vigeant of Montreal and Irene McDonald of Hamilton retained their men's and women's three-metre diving championships. It is Vigeant's third championship.

One of the 12 dives he executed was a 1½ twisting 1½ back somersault, a difficult gymnastic dive which the judges said they believed has never before been attempted in Canadian competition.

Vigeant gained the total of 121.11 points. Miss McDonald earned 96.02 points in her 10 difficult dives in the women's event.

Highland Dancing For Festive Week

Concluding this year's Festive Week programme the evening of July 1st will be a special programme at the Charlottetown Forum featuring Highland Dances, Pipe Band Music and a Virginia Reel competition.

The Highland dancing competition will include the Highland Fling for beginners of all ages—Juniors up to and including 9 years of age—Intermediates, 10 years and up to and including 13 years of age—Seniors, 14 years of age and upwards.

Sword dances—Beginners, Juniors, Intermediates and Seniors—same ages as in the previous group. There will also be an exhibition of Highland Reel and Petronella, and as an innovation the committee is this year sponsoring a Virginia Reel Contest. Interspersed with the various dancing contests will be selections from one of the Pipe Bands which will be on hand for the occasion.

Special Dance Medals are being secured by the officials and will be presented to the successful winners in the Highland Dancing Contests. The group being successful in the Virginia Reel will have a special treat provided for them. As in the case of other entertainment being staged during the Festive Celebration, a nominal fee will be charged non-participants. It is felt that the class of entertainment which will be furnished will far offset this small admission fee necessary to supply the prizes etc.

Instruction In Tennis Offered By Local Club

Young people desirous of learning the fundamentals of tennis will have every opportunity of doing so this summer. It was announced last night by officials of the Charlottetown Tennis Club.

Commencing this afternoon and continuing throughout the fine afternoons of the summer months instructions in the game of tennis will be given to young players on the Charlottetown courts.

These instructions are open to everyone free of charge and will be given by the senior playing members of the club. In an effort to concentrate upon the development of the younger players it is planned to hold junior play-offs during the summer. These competitions may be divided into three classifications according to age groups. One class for players 18 and under, another for players 15 and under, and a third for those 12 and under.

Although the dates have not yet been set it is thought the Provincial open tournament for men and women will get underway around the last of July or first of August.

Yawl Royono First To Finish

HAMILTON, Bermuda, June 25 — (AP)—The United States Naval Academy's big blue yawl, Royono, slid across the finish line at 3:16 p. m. EDT today to become the first yacht to finish the 675-mile Newport-Bermuda race.

The 71.3-foot yawl had an elapsed time of four days, one hour, 16 minutes and 28.5 seconds. Her correct time was three days, 22 hours, 54 minutes and 56.5 seconds.

Bolero, 72-foot yawl owned by J. N. Brown of Providence, R.I., finished second but was beaten by the Royono, which has a larger handicap as well as finishing first.

As time ran out it appeared the Royono skipped by Lieut. Cmdr. Frank Siagkowski, would win class "A" on the basis of corrected time. Boleros elapsed time was four days, three hours, 24 minutes and 53.5 seconds. Her correct time was four days, two hours, 19 minutes and 17.5 seconds.

The Canadian entry, the Wanderer IX out of Halifax, was not sighted among the leading yachts.

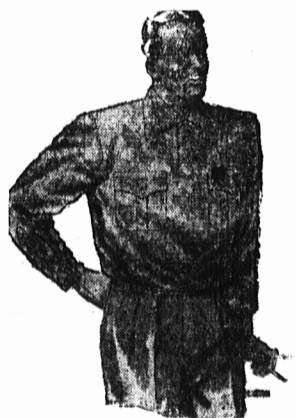
