## U.S. Senate Committee Gives New Rebuff To Eisenhower

WASHINGTON AP — The Senate finance committee voted 12-2 Thursday for an extension of the reciprocal trade program in a form far different from what President Eisenhower asked.

In the first place, the proposed extension is for three years. President Eisenhower asked for five years, and the House of Representatives voted five.

Also, the Senate committee wrote in an amendment sharply limiting the power of the president to override the tariff commission on the question of higher tariffs. This was a victory for those who say domestic industry needs more protection from foreign competition.

### AMENDMENT ADOPTED

This amendment was proposed by Senator Robert S. Kerr, Okla-

homa Democrat, and was adopted on a 8-7 vote. It is expected to cause a hot fight when the extension bill comes up in the Senate. Senator Paul H. Douglas, Illinois Democrat, called the committee's bill a monstrosity, "perilously close to a repudiation of the entire theory of reciprocal trade."

The Kerr amendment would have the effect of strengthening any tariff commission recommendations for import quotas or higher duties on foreign items held to be damaging domestic industries.

Under present law, the president may override commission recommendations. Under the Kerr amendment, a presidential decision to override could not take effect unless both Houses of Congress voted to uphold the president.

### Three Dead, Two Missing In Quake

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP) — An earthquake, felt throughout all of southeast Alaska Wednesday night, left three known dead and two missing Thursday.

The dead were three picnickers sucked into the sea when the quake sheared off the tip of an island in Yakutat Bay, about 200 miles northwest of here.

Missing were a man and his wife whose 44-foot fishing boat was swept by giant waves toward the rocky sides of Lituya Bay, on the coast 125 miles west of this Alaska capital.

The dead were Mrs. Jeanice Welsh Walton and Mr. and Mrs. Robert Tibbles of Yakutat.

Witnesses to the tragedy, Yakutat postmaster John Williams and his wife, Dora, said about 500 yards of the south end of Khanak Island heaved 20 feet into the air and then fell into the bay. The island is about a mile off shore.

## Give Up Cruise Plans, May Have To Hitch-Hike

SOUTHWEST HARBOR, Me. (AP)—Two Texans who planned to cross the Atlantic in an 18-foot outboard boat cancelled their trip Thursday and said they might have to hitch-hike home for lack of money.

Roy Sutter, 43, said he and James Pirtle, 30, gave up the project after having waited for three weeks for word and money from their sponsor. They identi-

fied him as the owner of a Fort Worth boat company. Sutter said their resources had diminished to \$26 and 20 gallons of fuel. He said they might store the boat here for the time being.

Sutter, who had planned to participate in a swim across the British Channel, said he had given up a position in Los Angeles to make the crossing. Pirtle relinquished a fire extinguisher business to devote his time to the venture. They said they spent five months preparing for the crossing.

Last week they returned from a visit to Montreal where they made arrangements to have a

trawler accompany them and refuel their craft four times en route from St. John's, Nfld.
