Oh, how gladly would I labor in any honorable way to assist in our support, if I only knew how to do anything properly! It seems to me that parents fail in their duty to their children, no matter what their circumstances, if they do not insist upon their learning a trade.” Let a woman learn to work in any direction for which she has talent and industry, and she need never fear poverty.

They are ever on the jump, as lively as crickets, and correspondingly noisy, and also as certain and aimless. 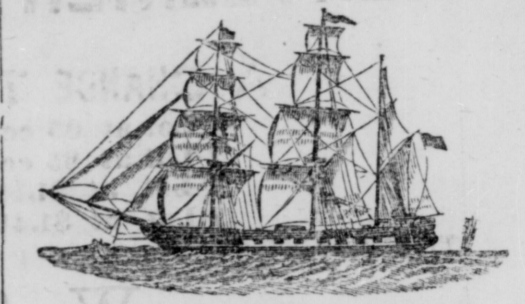
**Ingratitude.**

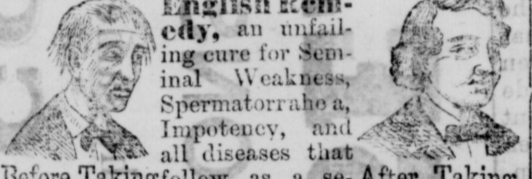
