## Nfld. Festival Opens Tonight

GANDER, Nfld. (CP) — A Breath of Spring, an English comedy by Pete Coke, will be presented by the Avion Players of Gander tonight to open the four-day Newfoundland regional drama festival.

Arthur Miller's The Crucible will be presented by the St. John's players Thursday and the Northcliffe Drama Club of Grand Falls will perform The Curious Savage by John Patrick Friday.

Saturday, final night of the festival, the Amateur Players of Corner Brook present Tennessee Williams' You Touch Me. Adjudicator is Andrew Allan, producer with the CBC in Toronto. He will choose one from among the winners of regional festivals in Newfoundland, Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia to represent the Atlantic region in the Dominion finals in Brockville, Ont., May 24-29.

New Brunswick is in a zone with eastern Quebec. Remember Mama by the Circle Players of Charlottetown won the P.E.I. festival and the Xaverian Players of Antigonish won the Nova Scotia festival with their performance of Wakefield Cycle.

## Heavy Damage Reported In Car Collision

Damage to Jennings' car was in the vicinity of \$400 and Nantes' car, owned by DeBlais Bros., received \$300 damage. No injuries were sustained, and the accident is being investigated by the Souris RCMP.

## Big Turnout Expected In Irish Voting

DUBLIN (Reuters) — A record vote is expected today in the Irish Republic's first general election in which civil war rivalry gives ground to economic and social topics as the main issue.

Political commentators are finding it hard to predict the result, unlikely to be known before Friday because of the country's complex proportional representation system.

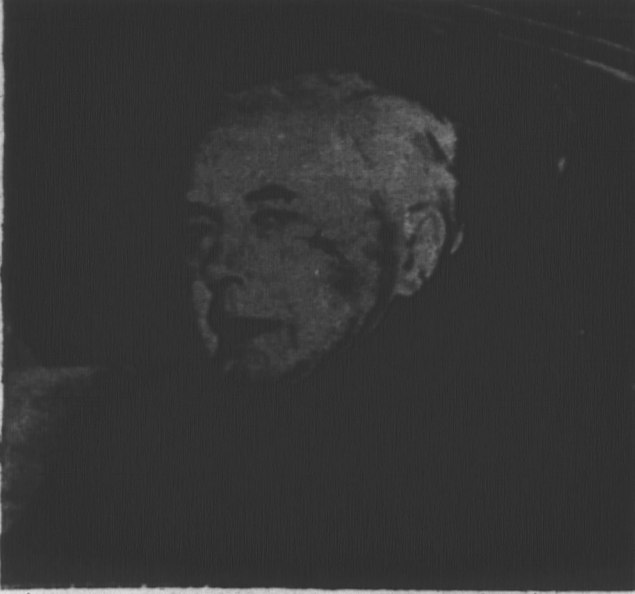
There have been traditional torchlight processions but old slogans and catchphrases have largely been abandoned. For the first time party leaders have been able to expound their policies on television.

More than 1,600,000 persons are eligible to vote for the 28

candidates for 148 seats in the Dail, or lower house of parliament.

**WARN SPAIN**  
LONDON (AP) — The British government warned Spain Monday it will stand by the people of Gibraltar in their present difficulties "and take whatever measures may be necessary to defend and sustain them." Gibraltar citizens have enjoyed

ready access to Spain for many years and large numbers of Spaniards cross daily to work in Gibraltar. The Spanish authorities claimed recently that these arrangements were contrary to Spanish internal laws and sought to "normalize" frontier procedures.

## SDU Clarifies Science Plans In Meeting With Cabinet

Representatives of St. Dunstan's University were received yesterday afternoon by Premier Walter R. Shaw and members of his cabinet for an informal discussion aimed at clarifying the position of SDU in regard to new science facilities at the university.

Members of the SDU group were university president U. Rev. G.A. Macdonald, Dr. Brendan O'Grady, Rev. E.J. Roche and Michael Hennessey.

Msgr. Macdonald pointed out

that SDU has been contemplating the construction of a new science building for several years, and that plans for the new building were completed "about two years ago."

He said the need for the facilities it would provide "are now most urgent," and that construction may get underway in the near future.

The SDU president emphasized that it was the wish of the university to inform the members of the government of the facts in order to assure them that these plans do not conflict in any way with the recommendations of the Royal Commission.

He reiterated that SDU is willing to co-operate to the fullest extent with all those interested in higher education in Prince Edward Island.

## QUEEN APPROVES AWARD

LONDON (CP) — The Queen, patron of the Royal Geographical Society, has approved award of the patron's medal to Dr. E. F. Roots of Ottawa for polar exploration and research it was announced Monday. The presentation is scheduled for June 14 and a society spokesman said it is hoped Roots, co-ordinator of the Canadian continental shelf project, will be able to come here for the award.

## Farmers' Income Up Sharply

OTTAWA (Special) — Prince Edward Island farmers realized a net income of \$13,426,000 from farming operations in 1964, a preliminary estimate of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reports. The figure is sharply higher than the 1963 income of \$6,981,000 and the 1962 total of \$6,808,000.

The P.E.I. trend was at variance to farming operations in Canada as a whole where realized net income dropped in 1964 to \$1,432,258,000 compared to \$1,654,753,000 in the year before. The increase on the Island was in cash income which rose to \$32,740,000 against \$25,764,000 in 1963. Income in kind added \$3,319,000 compared to \$3,818,000. Operating and depreciation charges rose slightly to \$23,921,000 against \$22,768,000 a year before. Value of inventory changes rose to \$798,000 from \$167,000 in 1963.

## Island Man Acquires Boar In Top Ont. Sale

Stirling Willis, Kingston, purchased a young boar at the Earl Zavitz swine disposal sale a few days ago at Alvinston, Ont. The sale was most successful with an average price for the 285 head of varying ages of \$119 each.

The top female brought \$510 and Mr. Willis' boar — he is three months of age — is the son of a sow that was the second highest priced animal in the sale, at \$480. This sow also is the dam of the highest priced boar in the sale and he brought \$260.

Mr. Willis, who is the president of the Canadian Swine Breeders Association, told The Guardian the price realized for the Zavitz stock was really tremendous.

Murray MacRae, Denfield, Ont., who is secretary of the Canadian Swine Breeders Association, said that to his knowledge the sale was one of the largest ever held in Canada.

Mr. Zavitz is a former president of the Canadian Swine Breeders group.
