## Vocation Rally Is Held At Parish Of Bloomfield

Another interesting fact to mention is that Father Doyle had a private and confidential interview with each pupil where he discussed the question of their own vocation. The Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament ended the Rally on each of the two evenings. We feel sure that this Rally will produce many fruits both on the part of the parents and the children.

## Conservatively Speaking

Did you hear Premier Matheson via TV Tuesday night? No, well as a voter you missed something. You missed hearing the leader of a Canadian party state that he was the only one in the Province with the ability to run a government. What unmitigated gall!

Sorry, Mr. Matheson, but your calculations are incorrect. There are hundreds of persons in this Province who have the energy, the ability and the integrity to manage our provincial business. This is not Germany, Russia or China, Mr. Matheson. It is simply and solely little old P. E. I. which has given more leaders to North America per square mile than any other section of this vast nation. For every person that has left home hundreds have stayed behind—surely among them there must be more than one capable of handling our business.

Like his federal friends before him, 25 years of Liberal rule has gone to the Premier's head. And, by the way, wouldn't it be ironic if the people of 4th Kings decided on September 1 to place their affairs in the hands of Mr. Matheson's opponent? Yes, Sir, in our humble opinion, the Premier of the Province was suffering more from heat than heart.

Our Island farmers do not forget that it was a Conservative government that made the tariff on American potatoes applicable the year round. They remember that the only time the matter was ever aired in the Liberal House of Commons was just prior to an election. After polling day such ideas were junked. No policy that might hurt the tender feelings of American business was ever supported by the former Liberal regime, so P. E. I. was forced to compete with U. S. potatoes in the Canadian market.

Not so Mr. Diefenbaker. As soon as the idea was propounded to him, the job was done and Island potatoes were able to compete for Canadian trade on exactly the same terms as the Americans. Naturally with a much superior product, the Province is getting the trade.

No, Mr. Matheson. Our up-and-coming Conservative party do NOT intend to use a sales tax to replace the amount they will pay out for teachers' supplements. Instead, they intend to employ a sales talk with their federal friends at Ottawa. They intend to state our needs frankly and fairly without any frills or fo-dor-ros or any assistance from Quebec experts, and confidently expect the usual Diefenbaker and Conservative reaction—help where it is most needed.

It was the Liberal propagandists who stated in 1955 that the people would be very unwise to elect a Conservative government at the time because with Liberals at Ottawa the Island could expect a much better deal by re-electing a friendly government. If this statement were true in 1955, the reverse is even more true today. In 1955 the Liberal fortunes were on the wane, while in 1959 the Conservative star is still climbing.

Don't forget, as our Liberal friends are prone to do, that over 35,000 votes, more than 45 per cent of the total, were cast for the Conservative party during the dark days of 1963. Since that time the people of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and the voters of the nation have rejected Liberal arrogance and turned to sane, sensible and united Conservative politics.

Shall we remain an Island of Liberalism in this sea of Conservative strength?

We led the way for Canada in 1967 and again in 1968, let us stick to our decision and lead again in '69.
