Blueberry Grower Is Also Underwater Cameraman

A ton of blueberries per acre yields like an abnormally large yield but that is what Bert Hickman of Alliston is harvesting this year on his seventeen acre plot that looks like a field of blue as one approaches.

Mr. Hickman has a fifteen-acre commercial plot and an experimental plot of two acres. More amazing, perhaps, is the fact that one picker with a picking tool can pick something like 400 pounds a day and some pick considerably more than that. Ten pickers average about 4,000 the daily, it is stated.

The fields are burned every three years and a bumper crop of berries follows for two years. The burning acts as a pruning agent and also cleans up the weeds.

Stan Waterman of Sargentville, Maine has been working capacity. He has approximately 150 acres of blueberries under cultivation at home and two hundred and fifty more under supervision. Although he has a very wide knowledge of blueberry production, he told the Guardian that this is the best land he has ever seen for the successful growing of this tasty crop.

The fruit is frozen and sold to various markets after it is harvested and cleaned.

Re-opening Old Uigg Church

The special re-opening services at the Uigg Baptist church Sunday September 8th calls to mind that this congregation is almost 130 years old. It was in 1829 that the Centennial service was held.

On that Sunday 28 years ago the church was crowded with worshippers honoring the memory of their pioneer ancestors. History records that the Scotch Baptists in that area had made considerable progress under the wise leadership of John Fraser and John MacDonald. But valuable additions came from Scotland in 1829. Among them was one Samuel MacLeod, an industrious and genial and devout man.

He resided for some time at Belfast, it is recorded, and gave his attention to teaching school and preaching the gospel. Later he moved to Uigg where he supported his family by farming, but continued to preach to congregations sometimes assembled at private homes, and sometimes in open air services until 1853 when a suitable meeting house was erected.

One of the outstanding men who went out from this congregation was the Rev. J.A. Gordon D.D., of Montreal who returned to preach at the centennial service in 1929. At that time he was assisted by Rev. J.C. Martin, Rev. M.A. MacEachern and Rev. A.C. MacLeod. Solists on that occasion were Mrs. H.S. Henderson, Mrs. W. Garret, Mrs. George R. MacLeod and Mrs. Vanderstine.

The present church, built in 1881 replaced the little wooden church erected in 1852 on the ground set aside earlier as a community burying ground.

The Rev. Samuel MacLeod, it is said, ministered to the spiritual needs of the community without ever receiving any set salary or expecting any. His grandson is S.E. MacLeod of Uigg who is following in his grandfather's footsteps as one of the main stays of the church.

The services on Sunday at 11 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. will be conducted by the present pastor, Rev. C.W. Passey. The special music will be under the direction of Blair Hackett.

The work of beautifying the church, prior to Sunday's re-opening, was done by members of the community who worked along with Ernest MacDonald as painter.

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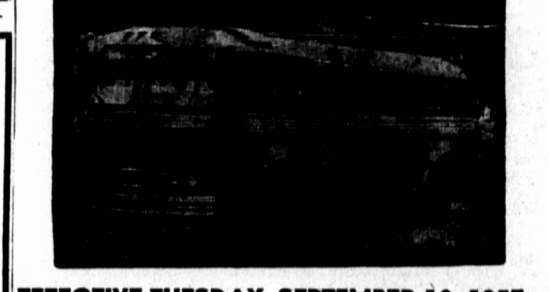
