## THE MINTO IN PORT

Arrives Last Evening — Inspected by Many Citizens.

The new winter steamer Minto arrived from Dundee about 6:30 last evening, and docked at Connolly's wharf. Her passage out was very rough at times, but according to reports she behaved admirably.

The Minto is 25 feet longer than the Stanley, with the same breadth, and is built to the highest Lloyd's register. She carries four quick-firing guns. The accommodation for passengers is good. Eight double staterooms run from the forward end to the dining saloon which has seating room for 24. The kitchens and pantry have all modern improvements, and are thoroughly equipped.

The engines of the Minto are triple expansion with cylinders of 26 in., 42 in., and 70 in.—a stroke of 42 in., and indicated horse power of 3140. Steam is supplied by two immense boilers heated by twelve fires. The six pumping engines are of the most improved style. She is heated throughout by steam and lighted by electricity.

The Minto has been inspected by a great many of our citizens since her arrival. She will doubtless prove valuable in demonstrating the problem of winter navigation between this province and the mainland.
