ANOTHER NEW CHURCH.—The members of the Old Church of Scotland—called by some the Macdonaldites—in this town, have purchased a lot from Angus McMillan, Esq., on the new street lately opened by the Town Council, and intend erecting a church thereon. This denomination now have churches at DeSable, Cape Travers, Canoe Cove, New Glasgow, West River and Birch Hill. Rev. THEY PICKED THE LOCK.—On Saturday evening last, says the Summerside Pioneer, the boys confined in the lock-up for shop-breaking, etc., managed with the aid of a piece of poker to pick the prison lock and open the door. Three of them started off, but only went as far as the hall, and the other two returned after about an hour's absence. They say they had no idea of running away. They were only playing with the lock for diversion and were greatly surprised when they found the door could be opened.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Massacre of Troops.

ROME, Aug. 13

An official despatch from Massowah says that 350 auxiliary troops under the command of Italian officers had been destroyed by Abyssinians. The killed include all the officers. An attack was being made by the auxiliaries upon Sagamitte. The catastrophe was due to treachery on the part of the native allies who joined the enemy during the fighting.

The following details have been received of the massacre at Sagamitti. The Abyssinian Chief, Debeb, assembled a force of 470 men with the intention of raiding Arkirko district. The Italian commander at Massowah hearing this, sent 600 Bashi Bazouks, under command of five Italian officers to try to surprise Debeb's forces. The officer enlisted the services of 200 members of the Assartim tribe. An attack was made by the Italian force, and they succeeded in carrying the village, but during the assault the Assartims proved treacherous and made an attack in the Italian rear, the Bashi Bazouks became panic stricken and were massacred while endeavoring to fly. Forty Assartims have been arrested, and are held as hostages.

Esson & Co. Fail.

HALIFAX, Aug. 13.

The grocery firm referred to in a despatch yesterday is Esson & Co. They suspended payment to-day with a reported liability of \$150 00. Mr. Esson lived in one of the finest houses in the city, and had a large and expensive family. The Halifax Banking Co have been carrying the firm for some time, but last week it is alleged that Esson broke faith with the bank, and the bank's refusal of further advances brought affairs to a crisis. The liabilities are pretty well distributed among Halifax and P. E. Island business firms.

Volcanic Eruptions.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 13.

Further advices regarding the volcanic eruptions in Japan state that three small villages are covered with sand and ashes and their sites thrown into mountains. The number of persons buried is unknown, but it is believed no one escaped alive. The following villages suffered most: At Nudo 45 residences were destroyed, and 12 persons killed; at Shibuya 17 residences destroyed and 26 persons killed; at Nagasaki five residences destroyed and 98 persons killed.

Blaine's Reception.

BOSTON, Aug. 13.

Hon. James G. Blaine and family arrived from New York at 6 p. m. Their route was one continuous ovation. Large crowds greeted the returned traveller at all large cities on the route, to each Blaine delivered a brief speech from the platform of the car. In all his speeches Blaine emphasized the importance of the issue of the present campaign, declaring that the Democrats meant to inaugurate free trade, and that their policy would destroy American industries and ruin American workmen.

The Shorthand Society.

TORONTO, Aug. 13.

The seventh annual convention of the Canadian Shorthand Society met here to-day in the type writing contest. Miss Orr, of New York, won the gold medal. Her skill in manipulating the machine was marvellous. McGurrin, of Salt Lake City secured a silver medal. Of a possible 5,000 points Miss Orr made 4,925, and McGurrin 4,756.

Killed His Wife.

MONTREAL, Aug. 13.

It is stated that Jacobs, the Caughnawaga murderer, killed his wife while he was intoxicated, and considerable indignation is felt in Montreal at the conduct of the saloon keeper who supplied the unfortunate Indian with whiskey in violation of the law.

On the Retired List.

BERLIN, Aug. 13.

Gen. Von Moltke has been placed on the retired list, and Gen. Von Waldersee succeeds him. Emperor William has written Gen. Von Moltke a gracious and affectionate letter, nominating him President of the Country Defence.

Suicide of a Constable.

MONTREAL, Aug. 13.

Londreat, a special constable employed in Montreal, committed suicide on Sunday by jumping off an excursion steamer into the river. No reason is assigned for the act.

The Parnell "Times" Affair.

LONDON, Aug. 13.

The Scottish courts have taken recess until October. It is likely that the suit of Parnell against the Times will be tried in Scotland in November.

A Rumor Denied.

OTTAWA, Aug. 13.

The Minister of Customs leaves for the Pacific on Wednesday. He denies the rumor regarding his intended marriage.

J. D. Leary's raft reached port safely last night after ten days trip from Joggins, Nova Scotia.
