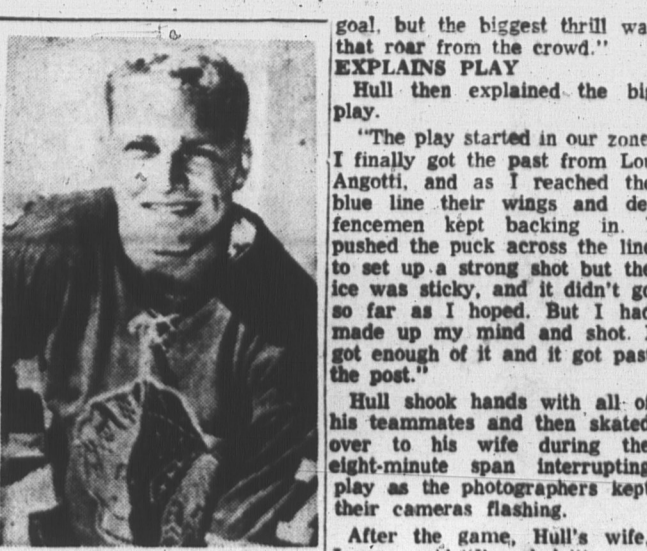

# Bob Hull Gets 51st

**CHICAGO (AP)**—Bobby Hull, hockey's golden jet, has the National Hockey League scoring record of 51 goals in his back pocket and Chicago Black Hawks are ready to make a run for their first league championship.

"It felt wonderful and certainly was a load off my back," said the handsome, blonde Hull in the dressing room. "I'm glad it came at a time we needed it. It was a thrill getting the 51st goal."

Hull shook hands with all of his teammates and then skated over to his wife during the eight-minute span interrupting play as the photographers kept their cameras flashing.

After the game, Hull's wife, Joanne, said: "I'm glad it's over with. I was really breathless. Now that it's over, it's good for him and good for the team."

Billy Reay, coach of the Hawks, said he never doubted Bobby would get the record. "I was beginning to wonder if we were ever going to get a break. Chico Maki's goal turned us loose and broke it open. What a difference it makes when that puck goes into the net."

"I've said all along with his record didn't worry me," added Reay. "Look, we've got to get goals from Bobby or else we can forget it."

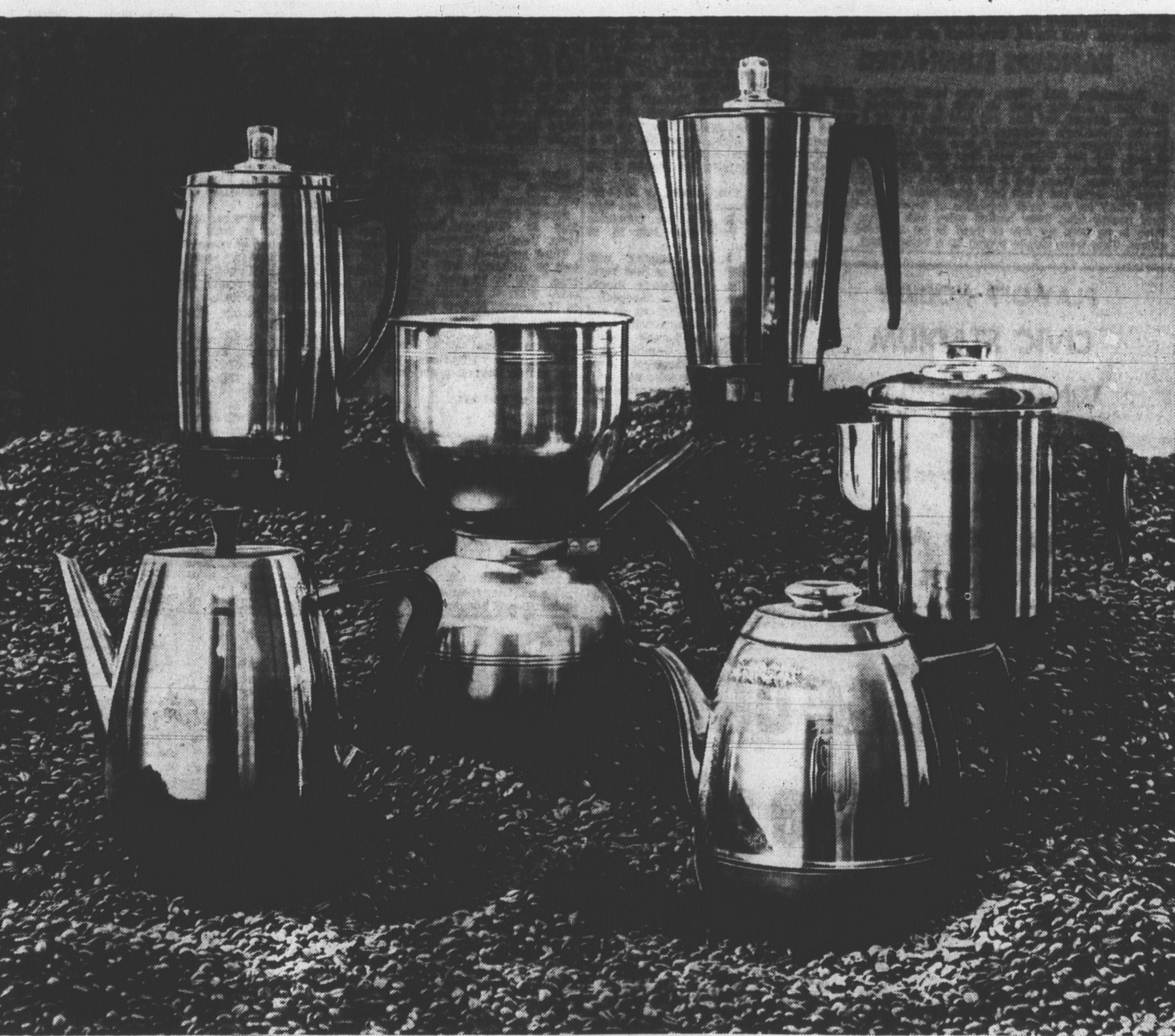


