Queen's Printer Bill Approved

Second reading approval in principle was given a bill in the Legislature yesterday that will make the Queen's Printer an officer of the provincial secretary's department instead of farming out the work commercially.

According to the act, the Queen's Printer shall print, or have printed and published, the statutes of the province, the Royal Gazette, the Journal of the Legislative Assembly and other books and papers required to be printed by law at the expense of the province.

The bill, promoted by Provincial Secretary J. David Stewart, provides that the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council can appoint a Queen's Printer "and fix the salary and prescribe the duties pertaining to the office."

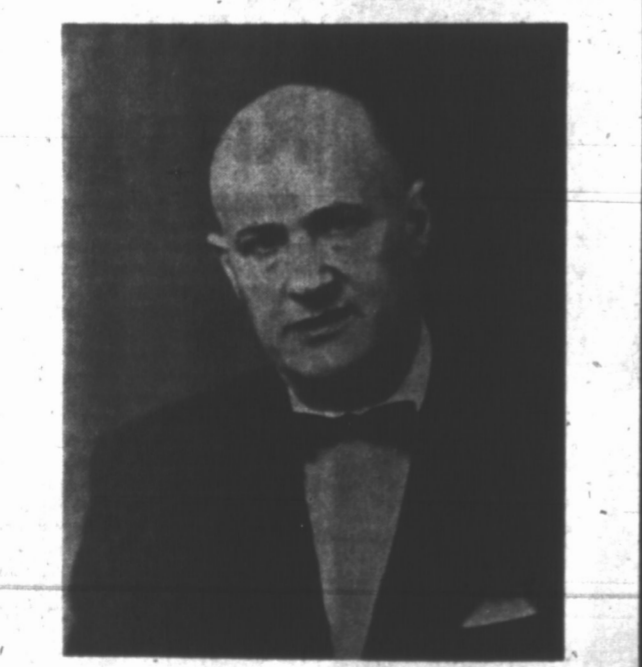
