TO START BIG AIRLIFT EDMONTON (CP) — Two C-119 Flying Boxcars are getting ready for the heaviest airlift ever undertaken by the RCAF to supply the joint Canadian-United States Arctic weather stations. Starting April 11 the planes will ferry more than 1,200,000 pounds of fresh and frozen food, prefabricated buildings, fuel, and heavy equipment from Resolute Bay, N.W.T., 1,750 air miles northeast of Edmonton, to five weather stations. The supplies were taken to Resolute Bay by ship.

SOLDIERS BREAK OUT LONDON, Ont. (CP) — Five soldiers under detention at Wolseley barracks broke out of the guardhouse Sunday night, police reported. ### Eisenhower Keeps Israeli Request For Arms On Ice

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower is reported to have reaffirmed administration policy of keeping Israel's \$63,000,000 arms request in a state of suspension indefinitely—neither approving nor rejecting it.

Eisenhower and State Secretary Dulles reviewed the Middle East crisis in a meeting at the White House Wednesday.

Israel Ambassador Abba Eban confedered with Dulles at the state department later in the week. It is understood that Eban asked that the long-pending request for defensive weapons be given a new look to determine whether some of the arms might be released in the immediate future.

Dulles is reported to have given Eban no encouragement although that Eban said he understood that the State at its defence departments have put the list under more active consideration.

The Israelis at first requested approval for the purchase of \$50,000,000 worth of arms here last November, to counter balance Egypt's purchase of arms from the Communist bloc. The request was never turned down but neither was it approved. Later the list was revised and increased to an estimated value of \$63,000,000.

Eisenhower is reported to have instructed Dulles to continue to keep the Israeli request in a suspended state while seeking a basis for an Israeli-Arab settlement.

Journal by Dr. Harold Elliott of Montreal, traffic committee chairman, may be worked out at the conference.
