

Carol Lane Safety Prize Awarded To Hunter R. WI

Three women's organizations were recently presented with Carol Lane Safety Awards at the Eleventh Annual Conference of the Canadian Highway Safety Council in Winnipeg. The presentations were made by Carol Lane, Women's Travel Director for Shell Canada Limited, which sponsors the awards. Administration is handled by the Council and the National Safety League of Canada in Ottawa.

The three national safety awards are selected from winners of the ten provincial Women's Safety Awards, also sponsored by Shell and administered by provincial safety organizations. A total of thirty-five entries competed for the provincial awards indicating the growing interest and concern Canadian women are taking in safety work. Safety for children from pre-schoolers to high school was prominent among the entries with projects from every province including some measures to prevent accidents to youth.

First award of \$250.00 and a bronze statuette went to the Women's Institute of Hunter River, a small village in P.E.I., bringing top honours to this province for the third consecutive year. This extensive program covered first aid training; a swimming and water safety program; a high school safety essay contest; installation of highway signs at dangerous intersections; a bicycle rodeo; safety promotion in elementary schools; and a house-to-house check on home safety.

The second award was won by the Brackley District Homemakers Clubs in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan for the second consecutive year. Their principal project concerned fire safety in the home and on the farm. Effective work was done through talks, films and demonstrations; fire safety posters; inspection of community halls, homes, farms and schools for fire hazards. The groups also conducted programs for bicycle, water and road safety in some areas.

The third award was won by the combined efforts of three Manitoba Women's Institutes in Dumfries, Osprey-Stoney Creek, and Union. These groups conducted an extensive program including assisting in a government safety survey; poison control; a mouth-to-mouth resuscitation course; water, school and bicycle safety; and placing reflector tape on slow-moving vehicles.

The Awards program was expanded from strictly highway safety in 1963 to cover home and child, farm and recreation safety as well. Response to this broadened program has been encouraging and it is significant that all three of the 1964 national Carol Lane Safety Awards were made to women's groups who tackled a broad range of local safety problems.

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New Annan WI Holds 50th Anniversary Dinner

The New Annan Women's Institute recently celebrated its 50th anniversary with a dinner, sing - song and presentation of gifts, at a social evening in the Traveller's Rest hall.

In reviewing the history of the Institute since formation in 1915, the president, Mrs. Don Schurman who chaired the meeting, paid tribute to a number of original members who were in attendance, and presented them with gifts.

Mrs. Schurman, in her report, also reviewed the major projects in which the institute donated to the Ellerslie Fire Disaster Fund in 1959.

In 1919 New Annan had the honor of being the first Institute on the Island to merit a card of honor from the Canadian Field Comforts Commission for knitting socks for Canadian soldiers.

From the time the Institute was organized, Prince County Hospital has been the recipient of many donations, not only of money but articles as well. The Provincial Sanatorium, which became a reality in 1930, also received money as well as articles of linen from the group.

New Annan Institute was the first one to have all members subscribe to the Institute News and in 1951 one of the group's charter members, Mrs. Robert Williams, was made a life member at the Institute's district convention. Mrs. Williams is still very active in institute work.

The Institute also provides a Christmas treat as well as one at the end of the school term for children attending the local school. Also, for several years the group supplied cod liver oil capsules to the school and purchased junior encyclopedias for the school library, along with many other projects too numerous to mention.
