## Need For Study Outlined To P.E.I. Life Underwriters

LIFE insurance men from all parts of the province were in attendance yesterday at the Charlottetown Hotel for a regional conference sponsored by the Life Underwriters Association of P.E.I. and the Life Underwriters Association of Canada. Two well-known insurance speakers discussed the latest methods of life insurance marketing and service.

Aubrey W. Oldham, Ottawa, branch manager of the Mutual Life Assurance Company, and president-elect of the Life Underwriters Association of Canada, told the life underwriters that Canadian citizens are constantly requiring improved service from their professional counselors.

"Thoughtful, successful citizens in Canada are becoming better informed on economic and social questions in community, business and home life, and consequently require improved service," he said.

As a result, progressive doctors, dentists, clergymen, lawyers and accountants take frequent special post-graduate refresher courses to modernize their professional service to clients. Similarly, the progressive life underwriter in his endeavour to improve his professional service to his clients, takes specialized training courses and modernizes his service activity, he stated.

Speaking on "The Cathedral Concept", in his second address, Mr. Oldham illustrated four manifestations of life underwriting professionalism, and indicated a few methods through the Life Underwriters Association of Canada promotes the "Cathedral Concept" of professional life underwriting information and inspiration through private study, association training courses, chartered life underwriter advanced training classes, and insurance congresses such as the one being held here, he said.

## Second Speaker, J. Arnold Burdon, a representative of the North American Life Assurance Company in Windsor, Ont., told life insurance men they need a well-defined track to run on if they are to be successful in the life insurance business.

Speaking on the subject "The Secret of the Worn Carpet", Mr. Burdon outlined how he has learned to tell the story of life insurance naturally and profitably. He stated that he has developed a disciplined routine which includes five or six selling interviews daily, and resulting in from 150 to 200 new policyholders each year.

Mr. Burdon employed a member of the audience, and gave a full demonstration of the vital aids and other methods he uses to interest a prospective policyowner in the insurance plan.

## Tobacco Planting Is Started

It was learned yesterday from Research Officer Keith LeLachour at the Experimental Farm.

Plants have been set out by Marcel Moyer, Uperiville, Montague; Douglas Rolson, O'Leary; Merle Rogerson, Fanning Brook; John Power, Greenfield; and by the experimental farm which is conducting experiments this year on the provincial government farm at Greenfield, at Donald Nicholson's farm in Uperiville, and on Mr. Rolson's farm.

No large acreage has been planted yet on any one farm, but the work is underway. Normal planting runs about two acres per day, though it sometimes runs more than that, Mr. LeLachour said.
