NAVIGATION OF THE ST. LAWRENCE IN WINTER.—At Quebec a number of old pilots testified, that with properly constructed vessels, the St. Lawrence could be navigated in winter.

OUR SHIPPING.—Twenty-four thousand five hundred tons of shipping have, this year, been registered at the port of Charlotte, town. We learn that there are several new vessels yet to be registered.

The instrumental music was very fine. Our youthful friend, Master L. Watson, promises to be a first-class pianist. He acquitted himself exceedingly well in the splendid instrumental duets which Mrs. Nicholson and he played together. It is hardly necessary to say that Prof. Earle's rendition of Haydn's "Adagio Cantabile" and "Surprise" was very brilliant and expressive. The vocal music was generally well given. The Chorus "Let all the Nations of the Earth Rejoice," "Trio 'Lift thine Eyes,'" (which, although sung without an accompaniment gave Mendelssohn's beautiful and difficult harmony perfectly) and the Song "Nearer," were especially worthy of special mention. The music of the last song was unusually deep, powerful, and feeling. Mrs. Nicholson succeeded in giving full effect to all these qualities; and was rapturously encouraged.

DALHOUSIE MEDICAL COLLEGE.—ISLAND STUDENTS.—D. T. McPhee, K. McKenzie and A. Boyle of Charlottetown, have passed a very satisfactory examination, before the examiners of Dalhousie College and University, preparatory to entering upon the study of medicine, in that Institution. This examination is rendered compulsory, in order to meet the requirements of the Royal College of Surgeons, London, University of Edinburgh, McGill College, Montreal, and Harvard, Boston; with which this College is affiliated.—Com.

PRIZE MEDAL.—Lord Dufferin's Medal presented to the champion sculler of Charlottetown Harbour, was received by the Hillsborough Boating Club, on Thursday morning last. It is of silver and bears the same simple of the profiles of the Earl and Countess. Around the edge of the medal is inscribed, "Earl of Dufferin, K. P., K. C. B. Gov. Gen., of Canada, Comptroller of Dufferin, 1873." On the "reverse" is the Dufferin arms, surrounded by the inscription:—"Presented by His Excellency the Governor General," and on the rim are the words "Hillsborough Boating Club."

CHRISTMAS MARKETS.—The Christmas markets here were well supplied, and the prices ruled unacceptably high for the time of year. Of the butchers' stalls, that of Messrs Blake Brothers was the great centre of attraction. The carcasses of one of the oxen imported by them last summer was the largest ever exhibited in our market. Dressed and ready for use, it weighed 1665 lbs. In the stall of the same firm, were the carcasses of five or ten beefs, weighing in the aggregate 1526 lbs. Their best stall at 16 to 20 cents per lb. Other butchers stalls also presented an exceedingly fine appearance. The prices of turkeys, geese, etc., was very large.

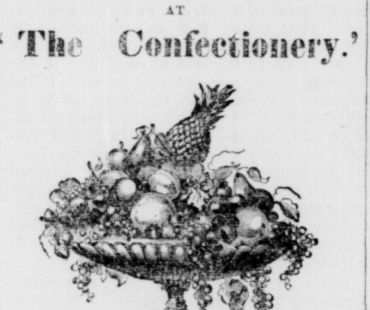
