MONDAY

TORONTO, Nov. 18 (CP)—Almon Boswell of Charlottetown broke into the winners' circle at the royal Winter Fair here Saturday. His toulose geese won the third and the fourth prizes for young males.

Miss Mabel O'Brien was re-elected president of the Prince Edward Island Teachers Federation at the annual meeting of the Board of Governors held in the Prince of Wales College on Friday and Saturday.

Other officers elected were, first vice president, Earle Jelley; second vice president, Elmer Pineau; secretary-treasurer, Miss Mabel Auld; recording secretary, Norman MacLeod; public director, Millar MacFadyen, and general secretary, J. A. S. Williams.

Roughwood continues to dominate the exports by rail from this Province as indicated by the figures for carloads forwarded from Borden to Cape Tormentine for the month of October, released by the Office of the Superintendent, Island Division, Canadian National Railways. A total of 404 carloads were shipped as compared to two in the same month in 1950.

Other notable increases in exports were livestock, fish, meats, oats, turnips, Irish moss, and lumber. Decreases were shown in hides, potatoes, 209 in 1951 as compared to 330 last year, hay and straw, and canned goods.

Shipments of potatoes from Canada to the United States under quota to Nov. 3rd were 15,611 bushels for table stock and 6,826 bushels for seed stock, according to the figures contained in the Potato Market Report released on Nov. 15th by the Marketing Service of the Department of Agriculture.

The seasonal summary, rail and water in carlots, contained in the report for P. E. I. are as follows: for the '51-'52 season, with '50-'51 figures in brackets: exports, table stock, U. S. 33, (41); Others, 17, (77); Seed, U. S. 54, (175); Others, (11). Total exports, table and seed, 84, (304). Domestic, table and seed, 245, (360). Total Domestic and Export, 329, (664).

TUESDAY

It is expected that several of the most rare of all furs, the valuable sapphire mink, will be exhibited at the Provincial Live Fox and Mink Show, which opens today in the Fox Pavilion at the Exhibition Grounds.

Under the auspices of the Prince Edward Island Fur Breeders Association, the show will run today, tomorrow and Thursday, and will be the 21st Live Fox Show and the 4th Live Mink Show.

Entries are expected to be around the 300 mark for foxes and 150 or more mink. Today will see the classification of the animals being undertaken by Parven Cass of Summerside and Beecher MacDougall of Ellerslie, and judging of the foxes will take place tomorrow and mink on Thursday.

Rev. Marvel D. Dunbar, pastor of the Central Christian Church, yesterday was elected president of the Prince Edward Island Ministerial Association at the annual meeting held in the Y. M. C. A.

One of the principal topics of discussion was the decision to ask the co-operation of the public in not requesting the holding of funerals on Sunday. It was pointed out that rural clergymen with more than one church in their charge were frequently prevented from holding Sunday services because of funerals.

No hard and fast rule was laid down at the meeting, but it was agreed that wherever possible the public would be asked not to request Sunday funerals in order to permit the ministers to hold services.

The November sitting of the Supreme Court at Georgetown resumed yesterday morning with Mr. Justice Mark R. McGuigan presiding.

The case to come up was an action for damages, Helena L. Robertson, plaintiff, executrix for Allan Herbert Robertson, deceased, estate vs. the Canadian National Railways, defendant, and Chester Burke, third party.

Messrs. D. L. Matheson, K.C. and G. R. Foster were counsel for the plaintiff and F. A. Large, K.

C. and Roy MacDougall, a member of the New Brunswick Bar from Moncton, for the defendant. Mr. John P. Nicholson represented Chester Burke, the third party.

The action is taken under the Fatal Accidents Act of 1938, and is seeking \$93,000 damages "in respect of injuries to the said Allan Herbert Robertson and his death caused by the negligent operation of the defendant's railway by the defendant's servants at a level crossing."

The accident in question occurred on Sept. 25, 1950, at a crossing between Georgetown and Cardigan, and not far from the latter place. The car was driven by Chester Burke.

WEDNESDAY

Improvement in the mink class, both in numbers and quality, and possibly a record entry of foxes, promise keen competition in the 21st annual Provincial Live Fox and the 4th Live Mink Show when the judging commences at 9 a.m. today in the Fox Pavilion at the Exhibition Grounds.

Leading breeders of the Island were placing their entries in the hundreds of wire cages in the building throughout yesterday, when the classification of the animals was conducted.

Although present day prices for fox pelts are almost at rock bottom, the quality of those being shown indicate the faith of the breeders in their expenditures to maintain and improve the market value of their product.

That this efficiency may be justified is borne out by the significance of recent articles in American magazines which have predicted that the coming generation of young women will show a preference for fox furs.

At the annual meeting of the Summerside Milk Producers and Distributors held in the Summerside Town Hall last night, a motion was carried to the effect that a delegation be appointed from the organization to meet with the Charlottetown producers and distributors to discuss, before going before the Milk Board, the matter of raising the price of fluid milk in Summerside and Charlottetown. The motion was moved by Ernest Walker, seconded by Harold Linkletter and carried unanimously.

It was the consensus of opinion among the seventeen members present that Summerside milk distributors should get two cents more a quart to bring them even with Charlottetown distributors, who it is understood, intend asking for a one-cent increase. This would put the price of milk in both centers at 18 cents a quart.

At a public meeting held in the Alberton Court House last evening for the purpose of re-organizing the fire brigade, Mr. Jack Profit was appointed as fire chief of the newly organized fire department with Percy Hardy as assistant fire chief.

The meeting was opened by Mayor C. R. Profit, who regretted the small attendance. Mr. J. H. Myrick was appointed chairman of the meeting. The minutes of the last meeting were read by the secretary, C. R. Profit, and approved.

There followed a discussion on ways to improve the fire department with many suggestions regarding the maintenance of the equipment being dealt with. Fire Chief Profit suggested that the Town Council be asked to approve the hiring of a man to look after the fire truck and equipment. The motion was carried.

WEST RIVER STATION, N. S., Nov. 20 (CP)—Wendell MacLeod, a native of Charlottetown, was killed today when the lumber truck he was driving was struck by a Canadian National Railways freight train here.

OTTAWA, Nov. 21 (CP)—Canada's Fisheries Patrol Service has reported 269 cases of illegal lobster fishing in Prince Edward Island so far this year and 52 prosecutions were imposed.

The Government said in a return tabled in the Commons that 5,097 traps and 41,333 fathoms of rope and 128 14-ounce tins of lobster had been seized.

The Fisheries Patrol Service had 41 men employed primarily on inspection but are also used for protection duties. The R.C.M.P. assists on request in exceptional circumstances.

The information was tabled for W. Chester, S. McLure (PC-Queens).

The annual meeting of the Montague Community Welfare League was held last evening in the Curling Rink club room, with the president, Mr. A. D. MacLure, presiding.

The secretary, Mr. C. A. Shaw, reported that records of minutes had been lost in the Masonic Hall fire, and since no meeting had been held last year, there were no minutes to be read. However, from the bank account Mr. Shaw was able to present a financial statement for 1950 and 1951. Expenditures for 1951 showed \$637.09, receipts \$801.42, balance \$164.33. Expenditures for 1950 showed \$2,268.85, receipts \$2,113.27, balance \$52.42. The two financial statements were adopted.

A radical departure in structural design, as well as a much shallower draft, will feature the proposed new Island type dragger now under consideration. An announcement about it was made last night by Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources.

Two members of his department, Mr. Eugene Gorman, chairman of the Fishermen's Loan Board, and Mr. Francis A. Campbell, inspector, returned this week from Boston where they discussed the dragger with the firm of Eldredge McIn-

nis Inc., naval architects of the Massachusetts city.

Mr. Cullen said the main difference between the new boat and the old type will be in the shallow draft. The new one will draw only four feet of water with a load of approximately 15 tons of lead fish. The older type boat draws up to 8 feet with a 30-ton load. The primary reason for changing the dragger design is to permit dragger operations from the smaller harbors, especially those on the North Shore. Regardless of how good the larger boat may be, it was pointed out by Mr. Cullen, it does not solve the fisheries development problems here if it cannot get into the necessary harbors.

OTTAWA, Nov. 21 (Special)—A plea for Federal Government assistance to the incapacitated and other groups of persons in dire need, but not eligible for pensions of any kind was made in the House of Commons this afternoon by W. Chester S. McLure, Conservative member for Queens. Speaking on the Draft Address, Mr. McLure affirmed it was the duty of the Federal Government to give aid to needy citizens.

"It is deplorable," he said, "that the incapacitated person, whose need is very real, is being ignored in the government's program of social security."

Mr. McLure cited instances of persons incapable of earning a living through no fault of their own who are a serious burden to their families. He urged Health Minister Martin to submit legislation to aid this class of Canadian before another session of parliament passes.

Lieut. Col. J. David Stewart, D.S.O., E.D., this morning will be sworn in as Mayor of Charlottetown before Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell in the latter's chambers in the Law Courts Building.

Mr. Stewart yesterday was the only nominee for the Mayoralty in the special election made necessary by the election of former Mayor B. Earle MacDonald, O. B. E., to the Provincial Legislature.

Following questioning of the legality of the former Mayor continuing to hold office after declaration by the Chief Justice that the office was vacant and ordered an election to be held this month.

The election was scheduled for next Wednesday, November 28, but with his being the only nomination Col. Stewart has been declared elected by acclamation.

This morning accompanied by City Clerk James E. Fullerton he will go to the chamber of the Chief Justice where he will take the oath of office and the oath of allegiance.

The newly elected Mayor will hold office until the next civic elections in February 1952.

Placings were very evenly divided yesterday when the main part of the judging of the Silvers was completed by George A. Calbeck at the 21st annual Live Fox Show, being held in the Fox Pavilion at the Exhibition Grounds. A total of 169 foxes were tabled during the day, and judging will continue today with the Standard Platinum, Standard Pearl Platinum and the Champion classes.

Following the completion of the fox classes, the 4th annual Mink Show will commence, with John C. Molony, of the Hudson's Bay Company as the judge. In the course of the afternoon, a pelting demonstration will be conducted by Dr. E. Rendle Bow-

ness, director of fur animal research with the Toronto Elevator Company, who will also address the members of the P. E. I. Fur Breeders Association in the evening at a meeting which will probably be held in the Vocational School.

Mr. and Mrs. John Watson, Summerside, yesterday received a telegram from the Director of Army Personnel, Ottawa, informing them of the sad news that their son, Gnr. John Earle (Sonny) Watson had been killed in action in Korea. No details were given, the telegram stating that further information would be forwarded later. This is the first casualty of the Korean war in the Summerside area.

Gnr. Watson, who was only 20 years of age, enlisted at Charlottetown in January last and went overseas in July. He was home for the last time on embarkation leave in June. In the meantime his parents had heard from him at regular intervals and a letter received within the last week from him stated that he was well, that things were quiet in his area due to the peace talks going on but that he did not expect that he would be home for Christmas this year.

"Sonny" Watson was one of the most popular young men in the circle of friends in which he moved and the deepest sympathy goes out to the bereaved parents and the members of his family.

Besides his father and mother, he leaves to mourn two young brothers, Robert and Hillard at home, five sisters. Mrs. Lloyd Inman (Lorraine), Hamilton, Ont., Mrs. Joseph Gallant (Doris), London, Ont., and Joan, Shirley and Patricia at home. — S.
