Quote: "RCMP Supervisor Fish Found By Children." "The report went on to say that a number of large rainbow trout that had been killed by chemical wastes dumped among the weeds in shallow water. The news item also stated: "Extreme caution is urged by RCMP in the handling of chemicals used for spraying and killing potato tops due to the danger to livestock as well as fish and game. It was also pointed out that the use of these poisons has proven fatal to cattle and other livestock as well as large numbers of birds in many of the province's streams where a little precaution by the hunter would have eliminated any danger.
