Prince Co. Blood Donor Clinics Opening Today

With the arrival of the mobile Red Cross blood donor team from Halifax at Summerside last evening, this week's four-day series of clinics in Prince County will get underway today at Summerside where the sessions will be held at the Cassadaga Home from 2 to 4 this afternoon, and from 7 to 9 this evening, and tomorrow at the same time.

Creelan MacArthur, chairman of the Red Cross blood donor committee for the county, said that arrangements are complete for a street parade from the Cassadaga Home to the centre of Summerside this morning at 10 o'clock from the Prince County Hospital through the main thoroughfares to the George R. Pearce V.C. Royal Canadian Legion Home which will be the centre of blood donor activity for the next two days. The minimum objective for these two afternoon and evening clinics is 540 donors and the chairman reports that the committee among various organizations, business firms and parishes is very active in promoting the cause.

(Continued from page 1) emerged from their car. There was shouting and jolting. Mrs. Diefenbaker bobbed with her elbow at a demonstrator and he fell back. "I didn't know my own strength," she said afterwards.

Four policemen escorted the prime minister into the hall. More policemen were called in and five arrived on the scene.

The hall was already packed with some 300 Conservative supporters. Some demonstrators got into the lobby. Three policemen blocked off the others at the main entrance and the door splintered in the pushing and shoving. Two eggs hit the building above the outdoor loudspeaker while Mr. Diefenbaker was inside.

About 1,500 persons milled around outside the hall during the meeting while the demonstrators shouted epithets and boomed when Mr. Gillis spoke or any time his name was mentioned.

Some of the demonstrators carried placards with Liberal Leader Pearson's photograph. At one point, there was a chant "we want Pearson."

Mr. Gillis said at the Chelmsford meeting that the demonstration was not entirely supported by the Min-Min union. "I am sure there is political money behind it," he said.

Mr. Gillis, whose wife and daughter were in tears, said "as long as there is a drop of blood in my body, they can't stop me from speaking."

Mr. Diefenbaker said the minority must realize that every citizen has the right to be heard. "Freedom under law is the basis of democracy," he said. "Freedom of the right to be wrong, not to do wrong."

As Mr. Gillis emerged from the hall, with two policemen walking behind him, someone yelled "lynch Gills." The cry was not taken up.

Major Changes Announced For S'ide Livestock Show

SUMMERSIDE — The livestock show which will form a part of the Summerside Lobster Carnival program this year will be held on July 18 and 19, with several major changes from last year.

The cattle show will be a one-day show instead of two days and will be held on Thursday, July 19, commencing at 10 a.m.

Another major addition to the program this year will be the inclusion of horses and sheep. The classes for horses will also include carriage horses and a pony class.

Classes for sheep will include the Cheviot, Oxford, Shropshire, and a market class. The cattle classes will be the same as previous years.

Prize lists will be available within the next few days and will be sent to previous exhibitors. Others interested may obtain prize list and entry forms from the P.E.I. department of agriculture offices in Summerside and Charlottetown.

Entries will close on Monday, July 2, and it has been agreed that the date will be strictly enforced. Entry fee will be 10 per cent of the prize money.

There will also be a steer class, with three sections, 600-600 pounds, 600-800 pounds, and over 800 pounds.

The horses and sheep will be judged on Wednesday, July 18, starting at 10 p.m., and all exhibitors are urged to arrive early to have the groups the same evening to make room for

the incoming cattle. The cattle judging will begin at 10 a.m. on July 19, with the four-day of clinics.
