The St. Petersburg press accuses the Government party in Bulgaria of practicing terrorism in the recent elections.

It is believed that Russia has selected Prince Alexander of Oldenburg as her candidate for the Bulgarian throne.

A new prophet has arisen in Harri County, Ga. He predicts that the world will end in 1890, and has sold all his earthly possessions, with a view of timely settling up his own accounts.

The amount of tea which has already arrived at Vancouver, and been distributed over the Canadian Pacific Railway, is 3,428,033 pounds.

Pere Lacombe says that to create dissensions among the Indians and to exterminate them by war would be a mean and unworthy plan of disposing of them.
