FOR MILITARY TRAINING IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

It will be remembered that last year Lord Strathcona donated a handsome sum to promote physical training and military drill in the public schools. This money is vested in a council known as the Strathcona Trust of which Sir Frederick W. Borden, the Minister of Militia, is chairman. The executive of the Trust has now sent a circular letter to the various provincial Premiers calling attention to the condition under which the money is to be applied.

This circular letter sets out that Lord Strathcona had two main objects in view: (1) The improvement of the physical and intellectual capabilities of the children by athletic exercises and the inculcation of habits of alertness, orderliness and prompt obedience, and (2) the fostering of a spirit of patriotism in boys, leading them to see the duty of being prepared to defend their country, and giving them an opportunity while at school of acquiring a fair acquaintance with military drill and rifle shooting.

What is necessary to enable the Province to share in the benefits of the Strathcona Trust is that the Government shall undertake to encourage military drill in the schools; by making physical training a part of the curriculum, except in the lowest grades; a certificate of ability in

struct in physical training to form part of every teacher's certificate, and the Education Department to encourage the formation of cadet corps, including the practice of rifle shooting under suitable conditions by the older boys; all teachers except in the lowest grades within a specified time to be required to qualify to teach physical training. Teachers about to retire may be exempted.

The Militia Department will provide instructors for teachers of both sexes, until the provincial authorities are in a position to undertake the duty. The Militia Department will pay the authorized grants to teachers qualified and acting as instructors to cadet corps. This will enable teachers to increase their pay by so much. At the same time, to meet certain objections, the military training for boys will not be made compulsory. The parents in all cases will decide whether or not their sons shall join the cadet corps, or take part in rifle shooting.

We give publicity and call attention to these conditions in order that they may be discussed among the people. The Provincial Government must very shortly decide whether or not this Province shall share with the other Provinces in the benefits of the Strathcona Trust. We believe the proposition will be generally regarded with favor, but not with universal approval.

FOR AN INDEPENDENT INSPECTION OF BANKS.

The Guardian has received a pamphlet on bank inspection from General Manager H. C. McLeod of the Bank of Nova Scotia. Mr. McLeod who has come rapidly to the front as one of the greater bankers of Canada, takes strong ground in favor of an independent audit of banks, either by the Government or from some other external source. The pamphlet is a timely one, as the announcement has been made that the Bank Act is to be revised during the present session of Parliament. It is the one great weakness of the Canadian banking system that there is out an insufficient check on the direction and general management of banks, and to this defect, it is contended the failures are mainly due. And the bank failures in Canada in twenty-five years prior to 1906 amounted to 25 per cent as against 1 per cent in the United States.

Mr. McLeod points out that the supervision of banks by external examination is not merely experimental. In one form or another it is in vogue in countries transacting more than three fourths of the business of the world. In the United States there is a system of government inspection, while in Great Britain and other countries there is an independent audit which is of the greatest utility in bringing to light the conditions under which each bank is governed. There are, of course, on this as on other questions, differences of opinion among bankers, but the facts and statistics quoted by Mr. McLeod go to show that our much-vaunted Canadian banking system, well-adapted as it may be to the wants of the country in many respects, is still open to improvements in one or more important particulars.
