pleased with Truman's down-to-earth politicking. Others are said to fear he may go too far and get a "sympathetic vote" for the General.

Some writers on his train report the President is making a favorable impression on the crowds. Occasionally he is booed and heckled but his aides say he shows no concern about this.

Just what effect Truman's tour will have, only the voters will be able to say Nov. 4. But his slambang style of speaking is far different from the erudite humor of Adlai. He is supporting, or the blunt methodical style that Eisenhower uses.

Time magazine observed this week: "Nobody had fully appreciated the high level which the 1952 campaign had previously attained until Harry Truman went into action."

Truman, in a speech at Havre, Mont., recalled the General's statement that "there is no one thing that guides the policy of Russia more today than to keep friendship with the United States."

Truman went on to say that the Eisenhower statement "carried great weight and it therefore did great deal of harm."

The editorial asked: Why, if Truman lacked confidence in Eisenhower's military judgement, did he afterwards give him the highest military post within his power of appointment? Some Democrats are said to be

Newspaper Magnate Dies In Australia

MELBOURNE, Australia, Oct. 5—(Reuters)—Sir Keith Arthur Murdoch, Australia's greatest newspaper magnate, died in his sleep at his home in Frankston, near Melbourne, Saturday night. He was 66 and had been in poor health for two years.

He began his career as a junior reporter on the Melbourne Age and made his name as a war correspondent with the Australian and New Zealand forces in the First World War.

In London, after the war, he was appointed editor and manager of the United Cable Service and came into contact with Lord Northcliffe, newspaper magnate who controlled the London Times and Daily Mail, and made much of his late life and interests. Murdoch returned to Australia in 1920 and became editor of the Melbourne Herald, beginning an association that led him through the managing directorship to the chairman of directors of the Herald and Weekly Times Limited, the largest single newspaper interest in Australia.

He was also made a trustee of Reuters, Limited.

A lifelong advocate of increasing strength in international relations, he believed that Australia needed a closer friendly relationship with the United States. He was always a driving force in the Australia-American Association, being at one time president of the association.

He is survived by his widow, his son, Rupert at Oxford University in England, and three daughters.
