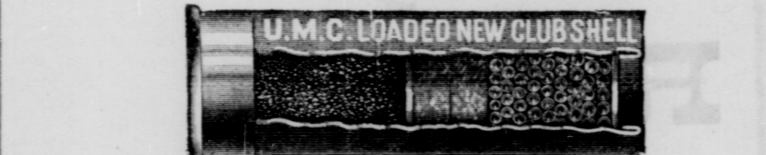

WATER EATS GOLD.

THE CYANIDE PROCESS FOR EXTRACTING METALS.

The Gentle Flowing of Water Over the Ore Cleans It of Its Golden Treasures—Cyanide Plants Being Introduced Everywhere.

It is not generally known, even in California, that millions of dollars in glittering gold are annually taken from rude heaps of base-looking quartz by the gentle flow of crystal water over huge piles of broken rocks that contain the precious metal, but such is the fact.

The process of robbing the earth of its gold has now been reduced to such a fine point, that Prof. Florence a few days ago, "that the gentle flow of water over the ore cleans it of its golden treasures, and this works well in cases where the old chloride and other methods are not so useful."

But the water of which Prof. Florence spoke is not so pure as it looks, though the eye could never distinguish it from water which is dipped by the old oaken bucket from the well in the deep tangled wilderness. The water used by miners in leaching gold from piles of mineral bearing quartz is charged with a simple chemical which has the power to dissolve gold and hold it in solution.

In truth the sparkling liquid which flows over hundreds of tons of quartz, trickles through the mines and over the hills laden with gold, is charged with a deadly poison, cyanide of potassium, a drug which ferrets out the minutest particles of the yellow metal, dissolves them and brings the precious burden to the surface for conversion into refined gold again.

The cyanide process is as noiseless and unerring as the laws of gravitation, and it is so simple that even the majestic dance of the house unbidden by darkness or weather, by disasters of flood or fire.

The State Mining Bureau of California was one of the first in the United States to investigate the merits of the cyanide process, and since the earliest investigations the method has been extensively used.

It is so interesting that its results are nothing less than marvelous. This method of extracting both gold and silver from ores is based on the fact that even a very weak solution of cyanide or potassium dissolved gold and silver, forming respectively, "auro-potassium cyanide" and "argento-potassium cyanide" in the language of the chemists.

This interesting process consists of treating the ores with a weak solution of potassium cyanide, usually by allowing the solution to percolate through the ore, or by agitating a mixture of the ore and solution. When this part of the operation is completed the cyanide is separated from the solid material, and the gold and silver are precipitated in metallic form.

The process is modern in its application, though it is long known that cyanide of potassium had been used to "eat gold" during the past five years, however, the process has been introduced into almost every gold field in California, and elsewhere, and more than \$20,000,000 have been recovered by the gentle flowing of waters charged with the mineral chemicals over heaps of ore.

Aside from the thoroughness of the permeating water method, its economy is a marked feature in mining. It is in favor with the gold mining companies of New Zealand, and at Johannesburg, Africa, as well as in California.

One of the most advantageous features of the cyanide method is that it can be applied to many gold and silver ores generally called "rebillion" or "refractory." The rebellious ore is placed in a vat for percolation, and the action is run in three levers from the bottom, by a pipe, rising slowly through the ore. The solution containing gold is carried through precipitating apparatus, where the gold is extracted by this process is very large. A large parcel of fine sulphurets from the Utah mines yielded an average of 2.18 per cent of gold value over the cyanide treatment, and similar results have been experienced elsewhere in the State. The cyanide plants are extended and the engineering process is everywhere becoming popular.—Cincinnati Tribune.

The locomotive engineer is a remarkably placid fellow, with a habit of deliberate precision in his look and motions. He occasionally turns a calm eye to his gauges and then resumes his quiet work.

While he has to manipulate a lever in his hand ready for instant use, and when they are used it is quietly and in order, as an organist pulls out his stops. The mere in the cab makes conversation difficult, but it is not as bad as that heard in a car when passing another train, with or without the windows open, and in looking out of the engine cab the objects are approached gradually, not rushed past as when one looks laterally out of a parlor car window. The engineer does not look at the side—he is looking ahead, and therefore the speed seems less, as the objects are approached gradually.

Those who have ridden at 90 miles an hour on a locomotive know that on a good road (and there are many such) the engine is not shaken and swayed in a terrific manner, but is rather comfortable, and the speed is not so apparent as when one is looking in a parlor car, where only a lateral view of the engine is seen, and every comfortable if he is quite sure of the track ahead, and it is only in rounding curves or in approaching crossings that he feels nervous. The engineer, however, it is by no means so doubtful if it is any more strain to run a locomotive at high speed than to ride a bicycle through crowded thoroughfares. Judging by the countenances of the bicycle rider and the engineer, the latter has rather the best of it.—Railroad Gazette.

Washington advises state that the seals that visited the Friendly Islands this year fell off of 4,000,000 (as in previous years) to about 300,000 this year. The forty-two Canadian vessels have altogether, from reports received at Ottawa from British Columbia, taken some 72,500 seals in Behring Sea and the balance in Asiatic waters. The catch in Behring Sea last year was 26,341; the falling off this year was, therefore, in Asiatic waters.
