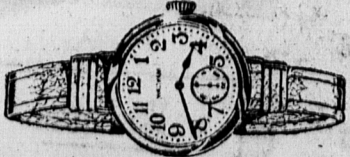

TRAIN OFF TRACK—On Monday, Train No. 11 coming from Tignish left the track a short distance west of Ellerslie. A train started from Summerside in charge of Conductor Howatt who went to the wreck and brought in the malls and passengers to connect with points east. A wrecking train proceeded later from Charlottetown in charge of Conductor G. S. Ryan and everything was replaced before midnight.

FURTHER PARTICULARS—Mrs. (Rev.) O. H. Peters, of Winsloe, will have the sympathy of a host of friends in the death of her brother, Mr. Leslie C. Boyd, of Bagelton, who died last Saturday, the result of an accident in a mill when his clothing became entangled in a shaft at Reid Brothers' mill a short distance below Gagetown. The young man was measuring the shaft preparatory to making a new casing for it when his clothing became entangled in the machinery. The shaft was located about three feet above the ground and about three feet below the first floor of the mill. The men in the mill overheard him and called out to him when he fell. He was taken first to the bank house and later removed to his home, where he died about 5 o'clock in the afternoon, about six hours after the accident occurred. He remained conscious until the end and was able to tell his father the circumstances of the accident. His body was badly bruised and his legs broken in several places as a result of the violent striking of his body against the beam above the shaft.

AT THE CLOSING—The Guard of Honor, under command of Capt. Tom Rogers made an excellent showing at the closing of the House yesterday afternoon, headed by the Veteran's Band, which discoursed some fine selections. The Guard was duly praised by the admiring throngs who lined the streets and most complimentary remarks were also passed on the thirty cadets from St. Dunstan's University Cadet Corps, who made up part of the Guard.

Imperial Oil Co's Conveyance Pipe Breaks. What might have proved a serious accident, possibly a tragedy, occurred some time after midnight Tuesday when a gasoline pipe leading from the Railway Wharf to the Imperial Oil Co's tanks, broke, a few feet from the buildings of the Electric Light Plant. When discovered the machinery was allowed to stop and as a consequence the city was in darkness. From information gleaned at the scene of the accident this morning it seems the workmen in the plant could not stand the fumes of gasoline, which they noticed between twelve and one o'clock this morning. Investigation showed a leak in the gasoline pipe, as above stated, the fluid being ankle deep on the ground and flowing into the shed where the coal is stored. A telephone message was sent to Supt. Jas. McKie who was not long in reaching the plant and who immediately sized up the situation. He ordered his men out of the buildings and allowed the machinery to "die down." The large boilers, had a good head of steam on and the two gas producers were also working. As is well known, these latter machines sometimes "back fire," and Supt. McKie stated this morning, this luckily did not happen, while the building was filled with the gasoline fumes; if it had occurred he could not say what the consequences might have been. One generator in the plant suffered from the fumes, being badly burned out. The damage will amount to about \$900.00. Mr. McKie immediately placed watchmen around the building, and they are still on duty. As soon as the Imperial Oil Company was notified they stopped the tanker, which is at the Railway Wharf, from pumping, and also shut off the gasoline at the tanks, but there were hundreds of gallons lost, before this could be accomplished. Yesterday morning a crowd of boys and men were carrying away the escaped gasoline in all kinds of containers, from three half pint bottles to five gallon tins. The ground is saturated and all one has to do is dig a small hole and dip up the fluid. An inspection this morning shows the two pipes, which carry the oil and gasoline from the tankers at the wharf, just a few inches below the surface. The break which caused the excitement occurred at a "union" and is about two inches long. Employees state the frost leaving the ground caused the pipes to heave and crack. It was about this same place that the fire occurred only a few weeks ago and of which there was considerable discussion at the recent meeting of the City Council. Property holders in the vicinity are raising a storm of protest and claim the pipe lines should be either removed, or placed below the surface deep enough, so that frost cannot affect them. As it is they are a menace, not only to the property of the Maritime Light and Power Co., but also to the citizens in the vicinity. The plant is operating, but the Supt. stated if the wind had been blowing from the scene of the accident, and carrying the gasoline fumes into the buildings, he would not take any chances. It is expected repairs will be made on the broken pipe today.
