He married Lady Anne Holland-Martin, younger sister of Lady Dorothy Macmillan, the prime minister's wife.

Hinchinbrooke's previous marriage was dissolved in 1958 and Lady Anne, who is 52, has been married twice before.

Two Members Resign From BGG in Protest

HAMILTON (CP) — Dr. Eugene Forsey, and professor Guy Hudson Friday announced their resignations from the Board of Broadcast Governors. Dr. Forsey said their resignations were in protest against the board's action in failing to issue a licence for a television station in Quebec City. "In our opinion, the time has come when a decision on the Quebec television application can no longer be postponed," Dr. Forsey said, quoting from a letter by himself and professor Hudson sent June 1 to George C. Nowlan, minister of national revenues. "The licence should be granted to the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation." "The majority of the Board of Broadcast Governors on grounds which we are wholly unable to accept, is of the opposite opinion. "We feel, therefore, that we have no choice but to offer our resignations from that board."

Japanese Trade With Red China May Be Boosted

HALIFAX (CP) — The Japanese ambassador to Canada said here there are signs that Japanese trade with Communist China will increase. Nobuhiko Gibba said in an interview China was once a traditional market for Japan but trade between the two Asian countries now is small. Japan does not formally recognize the Communist government. He said he did not think Canada's wheat sales to Communist China were a threat to Japan's trade chances there. Mr. Ushiba said his country did not find the idea of an expanded economic bloc in Europe "very congenial" but he hoped Japan would increase her trade with nations of the European Common Market. The ambassador said Japan had a good chance of enjoying increased trade with Communist China because the two countries are not discriminatory. Mr. Ushiba ruled out any possibility that Japan would form a similar economic pact with Asian nations. "We are a separate nation from the rest of the world and such an economic group would be impractical." The third hearing had been at the end of May and the resignations are the result, he said. Dr. Forsey is here attending the Conference of Learned Societies. He is president of the Canadian Political Science Association.

Retired Patriot Employee, James Coyle, Passes At 79

James (Jimmy) Coyle, 79, former Patriot composing room foreman, and believed to be the last member of the famous Abegweit football team of the early days of the century, died Thursday night at the Charlottetown Hospital. Mr. Coyle was also keenly interested in track and field sports, and for many years was an active official at every meet held here. He was born in Charlottetown, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Philip Coyle, and received his education at St. Patrick's School, later Queen Square. After leaving school he worked for a time on the old St. Northumberland which crossed the Strait from Summerside to Point du Chene, N.S.

ON EXAMINER STAFF Becoming interested in the printing trade, he joined the staff of one of this city's leading newspapers of the day, The Examiner, later coming to The Evening Patriot, where he remained until his retirement several years ago.

In addition to having played quarterback for the Abegweit, he had also played for a time for the Victorias of that day. He was a member of the Holy Name Society and Third Degree Knights of Columbus.

In addition to his wife, the former Miss Martina Gaudet, he is survived by three sons and five daughters. The latter are: Constance, Mrs. Alex. MacLean, and Mary, both of this city; Marian, Mrs. Bernard Dubuc, Chester, N.S.; Adele, Mrs. Leigh Glah, Long Island, N.Y.; and Gertrude, Toronto.

The sons are Dr. J.J. Coyle and Joseph, of Charlottetown, and Fred, Toronto. Two other sons, Jack and Philip, were killed while serving with the R.C.A.F. in World War Two and in 1956.
