## THE WORLD'S COSMOPOLIS.

Surprisingly Large Alien Element in the Population of Paris.

Some surprising facts about the cosmopolitan character of the population of Paris, especially the enormous number of Germans in the city, have been learned by M. Bertillon, the inventor of the anthropometric system of identifying criminals. He finds that scarcely more than one-third of the inhabitants of the gay city were born within the limits of its fortifications.

In St. Petersburg the native population does not amount to more than 22 per cent. of the total number of inhabitants. In Berlin it reaches 41 per cent. In Vienna 45, while in London, which hitherto has been looked upon as one of the greatest cosmopolitan cities of the world, it is at the greatest, the number of inhabitants born in the capital of Great Britain reaching 45 per cent. of the total population.

M. Bertillon learns that the majority of the inhabitants of Paris come from the departments of France immediately surrounding the capital. For foreigners, however, the most interesting part of M. Bertillon's researches is that relating to the alien population of Paris. No large European city contains so many foreigners. In London there are but 55,000 foreigners; that is to say, about 22 per cent. of the population. In Vienna, 25,000, or 24 per cent.; in Brussels, 25,000, or 22 per cent.; in Berlin, 15,000, or 11 per cent. But on the banks of the Seine there are 150,000 foreigners, or 75 per cent. of the population.

What is looked upon as the great "discovery" of M. Bertillon, is the number of Germans who, of late years, have made Paris their home, whereas, in Berlin, there are but 397 Germans, without reckoning those who have for some reason or other failed to disclose their nationality. After the Germans, the most numerous among the foreigners are the Belgians, with 45,000; the Swiss, with 25,000; the Italians, with 21,000; the natives of Luxembourg, with 13,000; the English, with 12,000; and the Russians, with 9,000. The number of foreigners, however, also shows a decided upward tendency.

M. Bertillon lays particular stress on the fact that of all the foreigners in Paris only 8000 are able to live on their own, or on land or property in France. Twenty thousand are heads of families, but for some reason or other, are unable to support themselves. Some 15,000 are employed as workmen; 17,000 as servants, while the remainder are the wives and children of those who are employed.

It is difficult to explain why there are so many foreigners in Paris. The annual immigration in the number of the French is perhaps one of the main causes. Foreigners come into the country to work, because unable to make a living at home. M. Bertillon thinks that the French are so many foreigners on French soil is liable at some period or other to be a cause of much embarrassment to the Government, and fears lest it become a real danger.
