IMPROVED CONDITIONS.

The fact that many of our merchants, shippers and farmers cooperated to make the first shipment by the Lake Winnipeg direct for Liverpool a good one is particularly gratifying and reassuring, for it shows public spirit as well as private enterprise. Only by an ocean steamship service between Charlottetown and ports in Great Britain can the people of this insular out-of-the-way Province be placed in a position of equality with the other Provinces of Canada as to trade with Great Britain. If not provided with such a service trade in respect to many agricultural articles produced here must necessarily pass our doors. It is evident that a steamship sailing hence direct to ports in Great Britain can take away, besides our cheese and lobsters, many things that cannot be sent by way of Halifax, Montreal or Quebec, and will consequently be a means of greatly enlarging the commerce of the Province. The success of the early shipments is a matter of public importance; for if we miss the opportunity which is now afforded, another may not soon be placed within our reach. The enterprise, unanimity and hearty co-operation displayed by shippers and farmers within the past few days is therefore highly commendable,—the more so that some persons have, for the nonce, sunk their present interests in the new venture. We hope that the same spirit will be exhibited in respect to succeeding shipments. There are, of course, many incidental difficulties to be overcome; and the returns in respect to some articles may not at first realize expectations. Perseverance and courage will be needed. Mistakes made in the past of the early shipments may have to be corrected. But that which the people of other Canadian communities thousands of miles further away can do successfully we are certainly able to do, if we are provided with the same facilities, and if we continue to cooperate and persevere. The leading members of our Board of Trade and its Council, under the presidency of Mr. Horace Haszard, are to be commended and thanked for the part they have taken in obtaining the service of an ocean steamer; and we hope that they will continue their efforts until a flourishing trade between Prince Edward Island and Great Britain shall have been established.

—A curious fact in connection with the operation of the United States railways, as brought out in Poor's Manual, is the increase in the number of locomotives in use. According to the Manual statistics, the locomotive power at the end of 1897 was represented by 35,810 engines, there having been a decline from 36,510 in 1895, up to which year there had been a steady increase. Such a fact, in face of the augmentation in the number and length of railways and the increase in the traffic, is a forcible evidence of improvement in the art of locomotive construction, in some branches of which this continent probably leads. The highest class locomotives of today draw fully double the loads that were the rule even twenty years ago, and it is not sure that the limit of capacity has been reached. A railway locomotive has been described as the most wonderful of human inventions, and its wonder-creating powers are being continually added to.

The statement is given out that the cost of the Sudan war since 1895 has only been £2,600,000, and that includes a million spent on the extension of the railway. Kitchener seems to have the shop-keeping qualities of his nation. He guarantees work of good quality at low rates.

WHICH SIDE?

An old toper of the genuine kind sat at the end of the building evidently enjoying the address, much more than some of the more zealous addresses on total abstinence, and rising from his seat he shouted across the immense hall, to the amusement of the audience, but to the disgust of the speaker:

"Brave old man, y'er on our side! y'er on our side! The clergyman looked at the speaker, all ragged and dirty, and a true picture of a poor drunken sot, and slowly replied:

"I am on your side! what! Surely not. And as he stood looking over the audience he went on to say:

"Y. s. I see it, I am on your side. Truly you would not have been what you are, had you not first been what I am, a moderate drinker. God helping me I will be no longer on your side in that sense, but only on your side for help and cleverness," and on that platform he signed the pledge, and was followed by many others, and he became a zealous champion of total abstinence.

Which side are you on? The side of the poor drunkard, the side of the rum-seller—the side of wrong?

A greater than John the Baptist said once: "He that is not with me is against me."—Math. xii: 30. There is no middle ground—you are on one side or the other and it is for you to solemnly answer the question, which side?

You are soon to have the privilege of showing which side at the ballot box. There is no middle ground there—it is "yes or no"—to a simple question. If you stay home, you will not be with the temperance party; and of course some will count you against them. A Christian will hear the voice of the Master and devil; let others do as they will, as for me I cannot be against Christ.

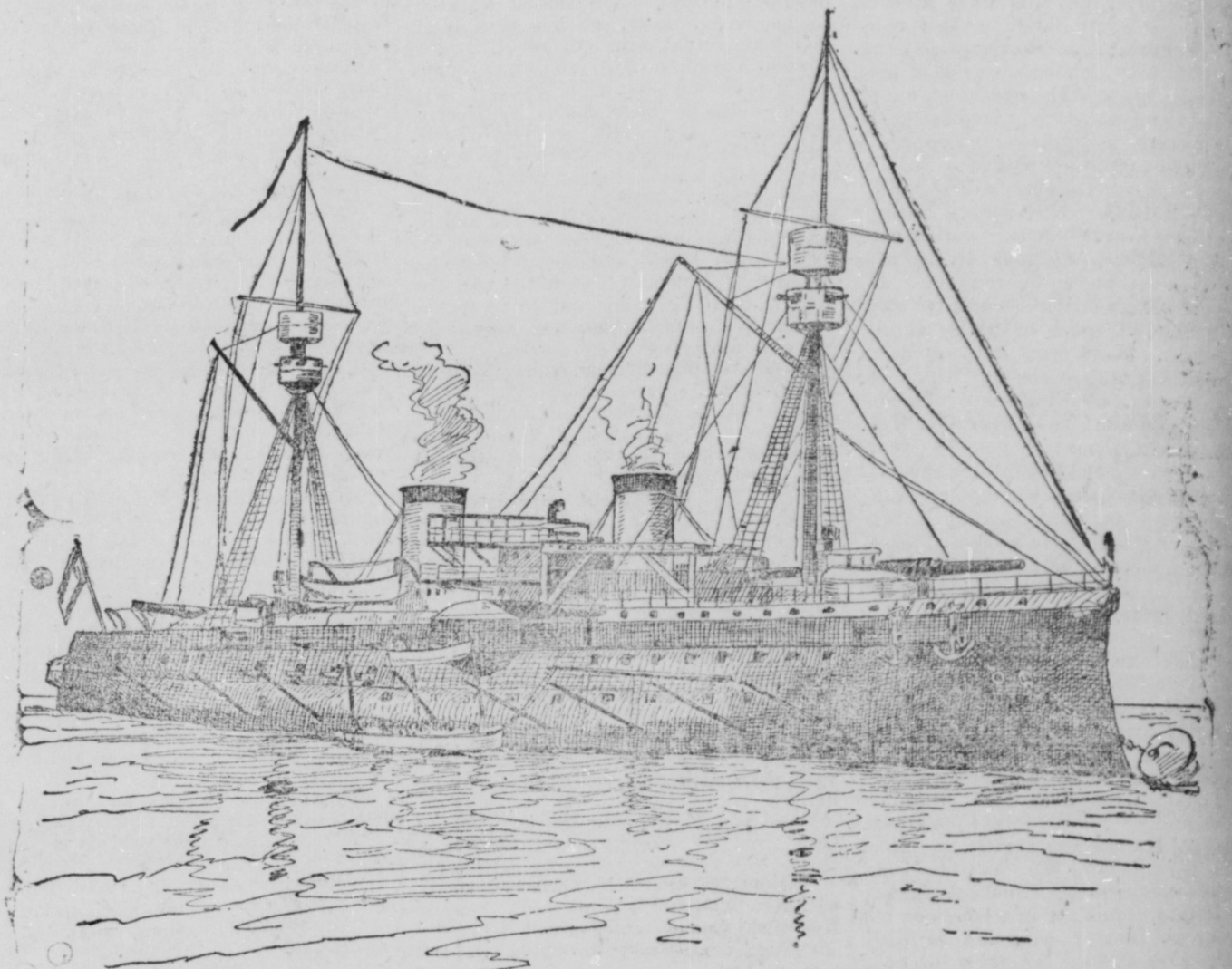
