Gov-General Massey Stops At Aklavik

AKLAVIK, N.W.T. (CP)—Governor-General Massey arrived here Friday in the far northwestern tip of the Northwest Territories after a 100-mile flight from the picturesque settlement of Tuktoyaktuk.

In the southward swing of his Arctic tour, Mr. Massey's plane came back to tree-line from the Arctic snow desert he has travelled.

The route of the wheel-equipped plane took the governor-general across the 1,000-mile-long Mackenzie river.

He was greeted by some 200 dwellers and Eskimos in this colorful settlement of white frame dwellings on the Mackenzie delta far above the Arctic Circle.

On the way, Mr. Massey saw dog teams headed for Aklavik, the drivers planning to attend Easter services as well as to see the governor-general.

Plans were in readiness upon his arrival for his attendance at mass at the Roman Catholic mission and a visit to the Anglican residential school and hospital.

Also on his schedule was a visit to the Aklavik curling rink—pride of the far north curlers—with Scouts, Cubs, Guides and Brownies forming a guard of honor.
